### No Tickee No Gas Card

Motorists should check now to be sure they have their automobile registration certificates, in case these are demanded by the rationing board before gasoline ration cards are issued, warns the Oregon State Motor Association. One sure way that the board can prevent duplication in the issuance of ration cards is to stamp each car registration certificate.

Such a program is being following in the East and probably will be used in Oregon and Washington.

Motorists who do not have 1942 registration cards can secure duplicates by filing a special form with the Secretary of State's office and paying a fee of 50 cents.

### Scrap Metal Demands To End "Graveyard"

If the metals in the literally millions of obsolete automobiles now in junk yards along the highways and byways are reclaimed, they will not only provide valuable defense material, but would also rid the country of conspicuous eyesores, according to Dr. E. B. McDaniel, president of the Oregon State Motor Association.

Dr. McDaniel said that Federal defense agencies are now organizing a broad program for converting scrap metals into production channels and the local A. A. A. club will cooperate in calling attention to "local automobile graveyards" which offer valuable materials.

On the basis of reports from A. A. A. national headquarters the club president estimated that around 7,000,000 junked cars are now piled up in various parts of the country, and will yield around five million tons of scrap steel, in addition to aluminum, copper and brass.

"Heretofore," he said, "junk cars have been allowed to pile up for use in salvaging parts for repairs to vehicles. Thus the organized effort to reclaim the materials in these derelict automobiles is certain to stimulate the removal of unsightly piles of junked cars. This is particularly true of old frames which have

remained after parts were salvaged. "Another advantage is the widespread employment of labor to separate the various types of metal for shipment to reclamation points. The heavy demand for scrap metal may lead to the end of the Automobile 'Graveyards'."
