And it is with rather a shock that we sometimes discover that so many other folks had the same idea we did and "took the bus".

And when we even find that there are no seats available and we are forced to stand up, we are prone to cuss the management a bit and ask why in the name of all that's topsy-turvy they don't put on buses enough to carry all the people who want to ride to town, or somewhere? Did you ever stop to think that maybe there was a very good reason behind all this?

Like all the rest of the major companies in our economy, we believe the Greyhound people are doing their darndest to win this war, even as you and I. They are doing their best to handle the increased volume of traffic with the least expenditure of rubber, and at the same time furnish essential service for those who must "keep rolling to keep America rolling"—the selectees, fighting men and war workers.

So the next time you are inconvenienced by overcrowding, or even are forced to wait for a later bus, just remember what Gen. Sherman said, and take it in your stride.

BICYCLE RIDERS

It looks to us like there is something drastically wrong with the bicycles laws in Oregon. Why is it considered safer for a person riding

A FAVORED CLASS

Labor unions are among the biggest businesses in the United States. Their total income from initiation fees and monthly dues, reaches an astronomical figure.

These unions, however, are very different in certain vital respects from other enterprises. They are not subject to regulation. They do not have to register with the government or make periodic financial statements. Their take is not subject to taxation.

Spokesmen for labor have bitterly fought the mildest proposals for requiring the unions to register with government, and to publish public statements of their financial standing, as required of other business. The unions demand special privileges not accorded other business. They want to remain a favored class.

Continued from Last Week

April 30th 1942

Here I am off to another start. To day was supposed to be my last day at the office but when I went to work last Monday I felt like the dickens so came home and stopped at the Hospital Office near our Central Office (a new building which has just been completed) and had an examination. The doctor said I had all the symptoms of the fever but had no temperature. After too blood slides and no malaria germs could be found and I had no temperature, he decided to let me go home and to bed. I stayed there until today, Thursday, and am up and about today for the first time. I feel okay now but am a bit weak to say the least. I had an upset stomach mostly so they treated me for that and now I am on the mend. I resigned the first of April. Finally found a girl to take my place, Mrs. Doenges, whom I have told you

about I think. She is getting along fine but since I played out on them this week I am going in Monday to complete my work for a few days before I call it quits. Gee, I think it pays to get sick for my slaves have been perfect little angels. I can't figure out why they don't grow wings for true—pure white ones at that! The little black devils!

While Missey has been sick they have tiptoed around the house and Johnny gently knocks on the door and asks if Missey would like this to drink or that to drink. We have had no limes in the house for months and I am very fond of lime juice so the minute I got sick Johnny knocks on the door and asks if I wish ice in my lime juice. I didn't ask him where he got them I just said "yes." Of course they have no conception of what you can or cannot eat when you are sick so Joe, the cook, wanted to make something special for me to eat so he made a bunch of chocolate fudge candy filled with nuts to surprise me. Of course I couldn't eat it but I told him it was lovely. He was disappointed to think I wouldn't eat it so after I had stayed in bed three days and had eaten nothing but liquids, yesterday he tiptoed to the door and knocked. I asked him to come in and in he walked with a tray in his hand which had a white cloth over it. He had a grin from ear to ear when he walked over to the edge of the bed then he bowed low and removed the cloth. Here was a simply huge plate of the most delicious looking doughnuts you ever layed eyes on. I just didn't have the heart to tell him I couldn't eat doughnuts just yet for he had worked so hard to please me. I told him they were fine, fine too much and I was very proud of such a good cook and that he must bring me a small, small plate just now so I could taste them. He rushed out and got a plate, just as pleased as punch, and I put one on the plate and tasted just a wee bite. He was so tickled to think at last he had found something I could eat—Oh, dear. (After he left the room I hid the rest of the doughnut until Joe came home and destroyed it for me for I wouldn't have told cook for anything that he was wrong again). Meyer wouldn't come up to see me when I was sick for he said, "Better for we not to worry Missey for she can be sick too much so I will wait till Missey will be well soon time". When I got up and dressed today and came out to fiddle with the typewriter Meyer came in and stood and looked at me for a long time then he quietly said, "Good morning, Missey". I said, "Good morning, Meyer, I don't see you for a long time". He said, "I just come to say I be so happy you be so better, Missey, so now I go to do my work good so I can't worry you." So I say I think it pays to be sick, what do you think?
