Dear Frieda and Del:

I will write you a note today to say I am still fine over here in Africa. Everett's last letter said you had sent me some pictures. They haven't gotten here yet but I am anxious to see them. If you could see how some people live in this world as I have since I left the states you would appreciate your home more than ever.

I have seen a country stripped of all its wealth and natural resources by the axis powers and I have seen people so accustomed to rationing and doing without that they don't know what a really good meal tastes like. What few civilian cars there are on the roads are powered by a big heating plant that burns charcoal. I still don't understand the way the power plant works but it does make a car run with lots of smoke and fumes. Bicycles, camels, and donkeys are the means of transportation in Africa. When the natives go to market, and they go for miles to market, the husband rides the donkey or horse, his wife walks behind carrying the load of brush or what ever they have to trade, and such traders I have never seen before. They soon learned the Americans would pay any price for something they really wanted so they always put two prices on the article which they hoped you would pay and what they would actually take before they would see you leave.

Parts of Africa are like California and they grow about the same crops, fruits, grains and vegetables which they irrigate in a make-shift way from wells. They farm just like their forefathers did in Bible times and its common to see camels, oxen, horses or donkeys working in the same team or a combination of any of the four. Most of this continent
