April 19, 1943

Dear folks:
Well, here I am somewhere in China. I also have a new address so take notice. I guess I am getting my wish because I certainly doing a lot of traveling. I also have had a lot of experience, but can't write about any of them. Next time I got home have some tea. (ha ha) I drink tea three times a day now, hot or cold. Boy these Chinese are very good cooks. All we have to do when we go to eat is just sit down and they serve you. You eat in courses. Soup first then the main dish, then dessert. We had chicken for dinner yesterday. It sure beat the southern fried chicken of Alabama. I am sure all mixed up about this money situation. I went to town last night and spent sixteen hundred dollars. And then I didn't buy anything. I also had my first ride in a rickshaw. I priced a silk pillow case, it only cost four hundred dollars. Dont ask me to explain this money because I can't just get anyway.
