Upon entering our hotel we climbed a stairway from the street to the second floor, there being no lobby or entrance way whatsoever. This hotel, incidentally, is the newest hotel in Venezuela and considered quite modern there. On the second floor was a small area of comfortable chairs and a balcony extending out over the street where one could sit and enjoy the evening breeze. To one side of the room ran an American Bar where the Indian in charge tried to please the American appetite with drinks from Lemonade, Orangeade and Coca Cola on up to alcoholic drinks mixed in as near the American manner as possible. There appeared to be no desk where we might register and on inquiring of our blond friend learned that we might register or not as we wished but that it was not necessary. The three of us wives, Mrs. Wright, Mrs. White and myself decided to share a large room together if possible so we were ushered up another flight of stairs to the third and top floor and shown to our room. It was very large and had twin beds the top of which were only about a foot off the floor. Another bed was brought in and put in the corner and this was an American folding bed with innerspring mattress. The twin beds were after the South American manner and boasted only straw ticks. The room was practically in the center of the building with corridors on all sides. There were windows on all sides, none of which had either screens or glass in them, simply a hole cut in the wall. At night we placed a weak looking lattice over the windows which did not add greatly to our sense of security. The bathroom had simply an opening in the outer wall with no protection whatsoever from the outside corridor or passers by who cared to glance in. Since the hotel had advertised air-conditioning we started complaining about no air-conditioning among ourselves to which our

maid promptly replied: "I will turn on the fan for you". We looked at her in amazement when she told us that she was West Indian and had spoken English all her life. The revolving fan was the air-conditioning, we learned, but it helped a great deal for the night was beastly hot. The temperature was 35 degrees in their language which made it a little over 100 in ours—this about 8:00 P.M.
