WHILE ROME BURNS

If high military men began bickering over how the war should be run and accusing each other of incompetence, it would not be long before something was done. Public indignation would force correction.

The men responsible for food production and distribution are as vital to the war effort as the military men. After the war, the food command will exceed the military command in importance. And yet the country is standing by while disruptive influences of chaotic proportions tear apart a high war agency dealing with food—the OPA.

Resigned OPA general manager, Lou Maxon, says: "In my estimation there still is no realistic workable over-all food program. Operation in this vital field has been strictly catch-as-catch-can, and OPA moves have often been directed by expediency rather than by any long distance future planning. . . the idea of OPA planning and executing any food program without utilizing to the fullest extent the knowledge and the complete cooperation of the food administrator's people and agriculture is just plain nonsense."

WARTIME REVELATIONS

In commenting recently on the tremendous effort being made by the people of this country to win the war, W. C. Mullendore, Executive Vice-President, Southern California Edison Company, records facts that must not be forgotten:

"On the surface it might appear that these airplanes, ships, tanks and guns, these radio and other electric devices, these billions of kilowatt hours of electric energy which are turning the wheels of the factories, and welding and transforming metal into weapons of war—that all this miracle of production which turned the tide of war against the enemy at the time when he seemed almost certain to triumph, has become available only since war began, and hence might be attributable to the centralized direction and control now exercised by government. our guns and planes and ships, and of the production of billions of pounds of equipment; we see the visible evidence of the ability of our railroads to transport men and equipment in amounts and at a speed never before attained; of the output of our electric utilities reaching unparalleled heights, and we are justly proud of the machines and Allies on the battlefield. But what our people most need to know and to appreciate is that the foundations for this production were laid not yesterday but during the past century; that this strength which is now saving the world is the product not so much of American physical and financial resources immediately applied to these mighty tasks, as of the abilities developed as the result of the freedom of men in past generations of American life—freedom to develop their strength, initiative and self-reliance, not under the guidance of government bureaus nor with funds taken from the people by the powers of government, but on their own credit and savings and through their own effort freely risked in many enterprises, large and small, some of which succeeded and most of which failed, but all of which added to the experience, the versatility, the self-reliance of a great people."

struck this area and while new idea which flourished at one time have been kept alive it has not been possible to keep modernizing them to the point of today's civilization. Consequently the streetcars which run through the cobblestone streets are the original ones with repair made to them. They are completely open conveyances with benches running across the full length of the car and with a step for length of the car on either side for additional passengers to stand on. Street car fare is 1c and you can ride for miles. There is one main street—The Avenida—which is wide enough for cars to park in the center of the street and also this is the only street which boasts of wide sidewalks.

The Avenida is lined on either side with beautiful umbrella trees which offer a great deal of shade to the shoppers who wander back and forth to the stores. If you glance upward into the Umbrella trees you will see orchids growing there which are beautiful. The streets, as mentioned are cobblestones and all streets with the exception of the Avenida are very narrow and similar to the ones in Venezuela, the sidewalks are not more than three and a half feet wide and you cannot pass between the lamp posts and the buildings if you are carrying an umbrella but must step out into the street itself. They have electricity and modern plumbing in all buildings and while the town is badly in need of a good coat of paint it is still a delightful place. Buildings are of wood, stucco and tin with tile roofs and sometimes tin roofs, the thing which amazes me so much is the fact that all buildings are perpendicular and flush with the sidewalk and you merely step from the sidewalk through a door and are in someone's house or a store. There is, with rare exception, no entrance way that I have seen so far. Where I am staying the building looks terribly run down from the exterior and appears to be a warehouse where you wouldn't think of stopping. However you enter a door from the street and walk up a stairway immediately in front of you and then enter the most delightful latin looking apartment or flat which is simply charming and beautiful. It has a large front room, four bedrooms and a washroom with three marble wash basins on the first level; then you walk up a few steps to a large dining room and another front room resembling a patio in arrangement and openness, down another step and into a serving pantry and kitchen and back are two bath rooms. There is a space of about four feet at the top of the outer wall before it connects with roof which is open air space and this open space surrounds the front room patio and the serving pantry and kitchen which gives you the feeling of spaciousness and freedom and the Trade Winds constantly play through the building so that living here is a joy indeed.

Joe and Jean and Jean's friend, Mr. Kauffman, had met me at the plane and brought me to Jean and Irene's apartment and we had dinner together with another friend, Mr. Rull, with whom Joe works, who came in a little later. Mr. Rull is a grey haired gentleman and is very nice. Joe met him when we were in Wash., D.C. waiting for passports. Jean and Irene have two servants, a cook and a maid and after dinner was served we sat in the patio and sipped our coffee while I asked questions about Manaus.
