

Instructions Given For Overseas Mail

Billy Abbott, postmaster, has issued the following statement in regard to mailing parcels to the men serving in the armed forces outside the continental United States:

Those who have friends and relatives serving in the armed forces outside the mainland are again reminded that Christmas gift parcels for the army personnel serving overseas must be mailed by Oct. 15 and for the navy by Nov. 1. Both the army and navy are making a special effort to see that parcels mailed during this time will be delivered to the boys for Christmas.

Last year there were a few people who waited until the last minute and did not get their parcels mailed before the deadline.

There are a great many of our boys serving overseas this year who will be away from home for the first time in their lives on Christmas day. Don't let these boys suffer the disappointment of seeing their buddies enjoy opening their Christmas parcels and not have any of their own just because the folks at home did not get them mailed on time.

The following information is given again for preparing these parcels for mailing:

Weight limit is 5 pounds and the parcel must not measure more than 36 inches in length and girth. In measuring the parcel use a common measuring tape. Measure the length of the parcel then the distance around the middle and add the two distances which must not total more than 36 inches.

They should be packed in strong containers and tied with heavy cord for the long journey. The sender should endorse "Christmas Gift Parcel" on the outside wrapper. Perishable articles will not be accepted and mailers are requested to not send items of food.

Miss Seiler Recruiting Local Girls for SPARS

Cherokee Seiler, seaman first class, arrived Wednesday to recruit local girls for the SPARS, the women's division of the U.S. coast guard. She will make her headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce building, 123 W. Main street, and will be available for interviews at any hour by appointment.

Miss Seiler is a Medford girl who joined the SPARS and has been highly successful in her field. Born here in Medford, she attended the local schools, graduating from Medford high school in 1937. She then attended the Southern Oregon College of Education in Ashland, and taught one year in Gardner and one year in the Howard school before enlisting in the SPARS in June, 1943. She was in the first group of SPARS recruits sent to the new training school at Palm Beach, Fla.

Miss Seiler is also the first Oregon SPAR to return to Oregon for active duty. Now serving as a recruiter, she will be in Medford for an indefinite stay, at least two weeks. Miss Seiler's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Seiler, make their home at 635 N. Central avenue in Medford.—Mail Tribune.

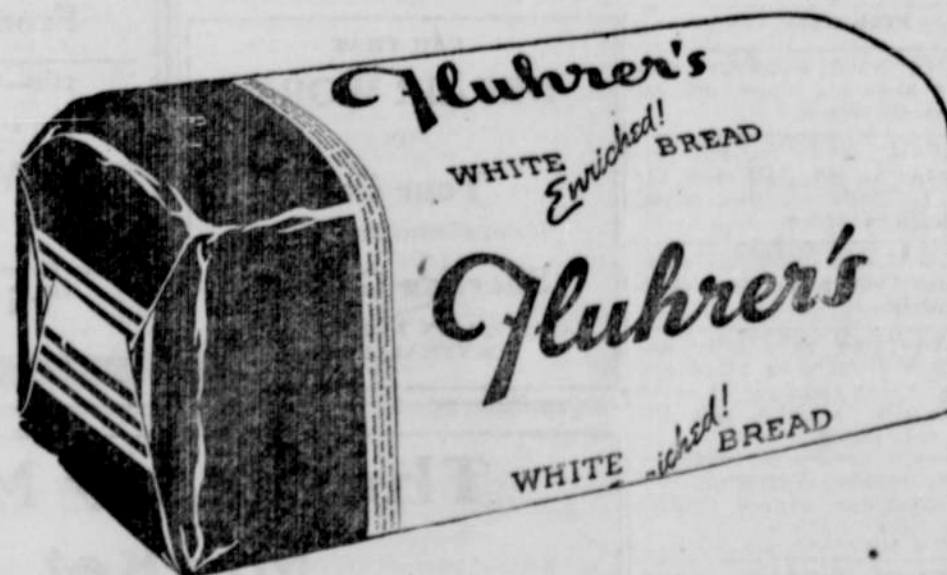
