Mr. and Mrs. James Murphy received a letter from their son James saying he was fine and asking them to send him paper and ink.

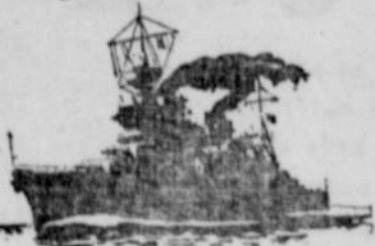
