CONSUMERS CAN HELP

The National Consumer-Retailer Council recently issued a bulletin setting forth rules for consumers to follow in helping the nation's food merchants meet food shortages. It says: "(1) Remember that your grocer is not responsible for food shortages. They hit him harder than they do you. His business depends on meeting his customers' needs. (2) Don't be impatient when your grocer is out of some commodity. Use your ingenuity. Substitute some other product for the scarce item. (3) Shun all black market practices. This is by far the most important rule. It is within the power of the consumer to wipe out the black market overnight. All she has to do is to recognize black market practices and refuse to pay more. Refuse to buy rationed foods unless you give ration stamps in return. (4) Finally, don't harass your grocer by asking why he is out of some particular food when the grocer around the corner has an ample supply."

The nation is fortunate indeed to have had a distribution system capable of withstanding the test of war without serious disruption in prices and operating efficiency. Out of pure self-interest, consumers should do everything in their power to help keep such a system intact.

END COMBINATIONS AGAINST EMPLOYMENT

A generation ago, laws were passed prohibiting combinations in restraint of trade.

Today labor is cursed with combinations in restraint of employment. It has become impossible for an American workman to earn a living in basic industries without paying for that privilege, and complying absolutely with the dictates of all- powerful union combinations in restraint of employment.

A soldier home from the bloodiest battlefield, where he fought to perpetuate the ideals of freedom, would find himself blocked in getting a job in his chosen industry, in the majority of cases, unless he bowed his head, signed on the dotted line, and paid the sum demanded by some labor boss for the right to work.

Our own government has aided and abetted this combination, in defiance of every principle of liberty, and contrary to the right of a free man to join or not to join any lawful organization.

Speaking of servants, guess I bragged too soon for I've had my hands full of problems recently. My little Brazilian girl, Elza, the laundress has been in the hospital now for a long time and has had six blood transfusions. She is better but still has to fight to survive. She will not be able to return to work and since she has no family or friends here I am still paying her salary and the American hospital is furnishing her the treatment, food and medicines. Her body is about 32% efficient in almost all functions including blood building and how she could work as long as she did the doctors are unable to understand. They cannot figure out how she had the strength to even hold herself upright to walk. Can you imagine anyone trying to work under those conditions. Since her departure from our case there has been a string of wash women and the most recent one started to work last week. She is also Brazilian and an elderly lady and I believe she will work out alright. She is needy also but since she is anything but beautiful to look upon it is difficult for her to secure work but in the setup which I have the laundress is never seen by the rest of the household anyway so appearance doesn't matter so much. She is very neat and clean and her work is very good so I hope nothing upsets this arrange-

Blame Floor Marks on War, Then Rub Solvent

Blame the war for the black marks appearing on floors from rubber soles and heels, suggested Lois A. Lutz, extension specialist in home management at Oregon State college, who then tells what to do to get rid of them.

The carbon black in rubber, which cause the marks, has been increased because of the rubber shortage, as it makes rubber more durable. The inconvenience it causes is just one of those things that civilians must put up with if they are to have rubber footwear at all.

These black marks may be removed with liquid wax, turpentine, or cleaning fluid, says Miss Lutz. The grease solvents, such as carbon tetrachloride or turpentine, remove wax from the floor along with the black marks, hence a re-coating of wax is necessary after the spots or streaks are cleaned off. Use of liquid wax will do both operations at once.

Miss Lutz advises removing the marks at least once a week, as they are harder to take off the longer they remain on the floor.
