Now friends, all this has taken a lot of learning. No man, however well trained a business man he may be, can hope to step in and take up such a job from scratch. He must familiarize himself with all sections of the county and the many types of lands therein and be able to place a fair value thereon; he must become familiar with the routine of all the different offices in county government, for it must be remembered that the county court stands in the same position as the board of directors of any other corporation and has general supervision of all county business. Not a single county warrant is ever issued until it has been approved by at least two members of the court.

And for the reason that he has spent the past three and a quarter years in this learning to really do a job, the writer is asking for your support that he may continue to serve the people of this county to the best of his ability.
