In a "comedy of errors" that turned out to be a field day for the Jacksonville Redskins, the Pointers dropped a conference game by a score of 10 to 1. The game was played on the winner's diamond, and definitely showed what lack of practice can do to a team as the Pointers had been unable to have a real practice for about two weeks. The Pointers collected 5 errors to the Redskins' 1.

The first inning went down one-two-three for both sides. The second inning went about the same for the Pointers except that Shrier got one hit. In Jacksonville's half of the inning however, Tommy Colley got wild and issued three bases on balls and due to a hit by W. Offenbacher, they got one run.

The Pointers again went out quick, in the third, and the Redskins went round and round, from two hits and four bases on errors. When the spree was over Jacksonville had scored seven runs. This left the Pointers in a bad hole, and in their half of the fourth they did no better. The Redskins got one more run in the fourth when W. Offenbacher connected with a single and scored on a hit by Harris. Then Harris was caught trying to steal second, and Colley bore down to strike out the last two men.

In the fifth, Anhorn got a hit but was left on base. One Jacksonville man got on base on an error and was left on third when the next two men grounded out. The sixth went the same for the Pointers, and the Redskins got another run from a triple by Kitchen.

This made the score 10 to 0 in the Pointers' last bats. Shrier got a hit and managed to steal second and third, then Anhorn struck out. Then Sage got a hit and scored Shrier. Holland teed off for a double. Then Colley grounded out to first and Sage was put out trying to score, to end the game, 10 to 1.

The pitching in this game was pretty even up, as Colley allowed only five hits, and Offenbacher five.

The next conference game will be at home when Central Point will play the return game with Gold Hill.
