O wire from the war department was received Monday but news of the message was withheld pending the return to Medford of the young man's father who with another son, Sgt. Pvt. Morton enlisted in May of 1942 and had been in Italy for the last seven months. He was a graduate of Medford senior high school. Survivors are the parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. O. Morton and brother, Sgt. Robert Morton of Malden Field, Malden, Mo., Raymond Morton, seaman first class stationed at Santa Monica, Calif., and three sisters, Olive, Coral and Linda.

Pvt. Morton was born May 22, 1924.
