But the fact is that the present assessed valuation of the real estate property of Jackson county is slightly over \$36,000,000.00. A one mill levy on that valuation will raise \$36,000.00. If the valuation should fluctuate the millage might be slightly more or less, but there is practically no danger of such a condition happening.
