To the Editor:

So many people have asked me about Undulant (Malta) Fever since I contacted it about a month ago that I felt it might be well to offer what information I have been able to gather concerning the disease.

It seems that most people are quite unfamiliar with the disease. As I also knew very little about it I have gathered as much information as I could find in regard to it. It appears to be well established that the fever is contracted by humans mainly through raw milk products coming from animals infected with Bangs Disease. I feel certain that I contacted the disease through raw milk which we had been purchasing from a local dairy. I have been informed that there have been three cases of Undulant Fever reported in the valley recently.

I have been told that there is a move under way to have a state law passed whereby all dairy herds will be required to be tested for Bangs Disease by a Federal inspector from the U.S. Bureau of Animal Industry. Personally, I would not again knowingly use any raw milk coming from an animal not tested by a Federal inspector.

The first symptoms of the fever would lead one to believe that he was taking the flu as there is usually violent headaches accompanied by chills and high fever along with stiffness of the joints and muscles. The chills and fever usually come on about the same time each day and end about the same time leaving one quite weak. A short time ago the disease was considered to be very serious due to the person not starting treatment when it is in its early stages and due to its recurrence many times after one believes himself to be over it. In some cases it has been known to run for several months and in some cases several years.

Many of the doctors, however, are now using a vaccine which seems to be very effective in overcoming the disease. In my case the blood test showed a high point of coagulation and I feel very fortunate in having overcome the disease through treatments of the vaccine with no ill effects other than a loss of weight.

Anyone having any of the symptoms of the disease should have a blood test made as soon as possible in order to check the fever in its early stages.
