They are white crosses on a hundred far fields; they are small gold stars in windows; they are memories in the hearts of mothers.

Then it is for us, the living, in Lincoln's immortal words, to be dedicated to the unfinished work which they have so nobly advanced; for us to be dedicated to the great task remaining before us—

"That from these honored dead we take increased devotion... that we highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain, that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people and for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

So far none of our boys in the U.S. Army have been killed in action, though several were injured. In the Navy, two fine and outstanding boys of the community, Vernon (Red) Holland and Homer (Stub) Myers, died in the service of their country.

Yet, the people of this city seem to forget that there is a war going on and here has been much bitter feeling and back talk lately—such as street dance and the disbanding of the service club.

It would be far better to discuss such matters more calmly. If they want any project done, 100 percent cooperation should be given instead of just saying "Let George do it."

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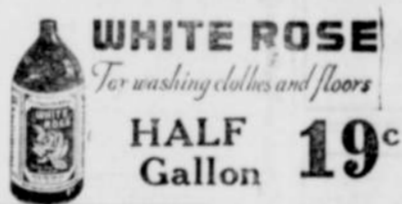
