South America As Seen by Local Lady

Mrs. Mildred Swain is writing to her mother, Mrs. E. E. Scott, from South America, where she is with her husband, who is employed by the government rubber research.

I could not possibly describe the interior of this home since I do not know the names of half of the pieces which go to make up the Portuguese atmosphere of the place and shall be forced to give an account in general. The ceilings of the downstairs rooms are high, of course, some fifteen to eighteen feet, and are all done in massive beams in a dark brown stain. The lighting effect is well balanced and mostly crystal from Europe. All furniture is priceless antique but not the antique type of furniture which so often "clutters" up a home. Instead this house would appear ill at ease if any other furniture were used in it. The dining room table is massive and long and the backs of the stately chairs extend some two to three feet above the head of the person sitting in them. The floors are highly polished with various colors and patterns of hard wood and oriental rugs are plentiful.

When entering from the front door you enter into a long beamed hallway graced with marble and bronze statuary and carved teak-wood chests, tapestries and priceless paintings. To the left of the hall is the dining room and to the right the living room. They are of equal size. We met our lady of the house at dinner. She was the bride of the wealthy Brazilian who built this home for her and she passed away just last October. She alone is left in this large house and so has opened an apartment on the second floor where this American couple now live. Our hostess speaks either Portuguese or English with equal ease and she is not only company for the little light-skinned widow but it also gives the little widow an interest in life since she manages the house entirely and the American couple rent an apartment upstairs and dine at her table with her. It was interesting to observe how fond the little widow had become of our lovely hostess and they conversed a great deal in Portuguese. When I could join in on the conversation she was more than pleased and you could almost imagine that for a few fleeting minutes she was pretending in the grand manner that had had been her privilege when her husband was still alive. Coffee was served in the drawing room and this room too followed the atmosphere of the other rooms, beamed ceilings, beautiful upholstered and carved antique pieces, marble and bronze statues, priceless rugs from the four corners of the earth and in one end of the room a massive carved marble fireplace almost large enough for me to walk into.
