Many Groups Join In Support Change State Bank Laws

Organized labor and the Oregon State Grange have joined the Oregon Bankers Association, Portland Chamber of Commerce and numerous civic groups in supporting the constitutional amendment to be submitted to the voters on November 7th which would remove the dual liability for stockholders of state banks, J. B. Booth, Chairman of the Committee supporting the plan, announces. "The proposed amendment", said Mr. Booth, "makes it possible for Oregon state banks to enjoy the same opportunity to improve the capital structure that is now afforded the banks of forty-five other states in the union."

"The present state law was enacted at the behest of Oregon state banks at a time when the same requirement was made of national banks and was for the purpose of bringing our state banks in line with the federal program."

Since the enactment of the Federal Deposit Insurance plan available to both national and state banks, the dual liability feature has been removed by law from the national banks. Forty-five other states have removed it from their state banks. The law, as it is submitted to the Oregon voters, provides that state banks can eliminate the dual liability feature, when and if they provide Federal Deposit Insurance. In other words, only such state banks as have the Federal Deposit Insurance which protects deposits up to \$5,000 will enjoy the right of removing the dual liability feature.

Waterfowl Shooting At Summer Lake

Migratory waterfowl shooting will be available this season to the general public at Summer Lake under the auspices of the Oregon State Game Commission, which has recently acquired the property formerly under private control. Improvement and development of the area into a combined shooting ground and reserve will be one of the leading postwar projects of the Commission.

For this season, the fee has been set at \$1 per day per hunter, and the Commission will have its own men in charge of the area. Hunters

will have to arrange for their own accommodations. However, as the game department is not equipped to furnish board and room.

The season for ducks and geese extends from October 14 to January 1. Bag limit for ducks is ten in a day of all species with an additional bag of five allowed of mallards, pintails, and widgeons. For geese, the daily limit is four of snow or whitefronted geese and two of other species, including brent. Only two days' limits may be held in possession at any one time.

Attention of hunters is called to the fact that the real brant seldom is seen in the Summer Lake area, and that the term often is applied locally to the snow or whitefronted geese.
