

Christmas Seal Sale Set for November 27

A change in the date for opening of the annual Christmas seal sale was announced Saturday by Ruth E. Bauer, county chairman, to a group of workers from many sections of the county, gathered for luncheon at the Hotel Medford. The 1944 campaign to raise funds to combat tuberculosis will open November 27 instead of November 26, as originally planned. The change, she stated, was made to avoid overlapping with the war chest drive in many areas and because of inability to get supplies for the earlier date.

There will be seals for everyone this year, Mrs. Bauer declared, explaining to the community chairman that they will be able to obtain more as soon as their original allotments are sold.

There are many new people in Jackson county, who will undoubtedly wish to aid this very worthy cause and their names should be added to the mailing lists, she stated.

Meeting with the group was Mrs. Elwood Hedberg, president of the Jackson County Public Health association, which sponsors each year's campaign to raise the funds, which are used in the tuberculosis fight exclusively.

Farm Prices Slightly Lower Than Last Year

Current data on trends of farm prices and costs indicate a further gradual decline in the purchasing power of farm products, generally, reports L. R. Breithaupt, Oregon State college extension agricultural economist. The latest figures of the U.S. department of agriculture show the index of prices for all farm products just slightly lower than a year ago, while the index of prices paid is up about 4 per cent, not including labor. The farm wage index is around 20 per cent higher.

These trends suggest that the peak of high net income from farming during this war may be reached soon if not already passed, Breithaupt said. The situation varies somewhat, depending upon the type of farming.

Compared with a year ago, the current position of crop products generally is more favorable than of animal products as a group. The general price level of all crop products is about 4 per cent higher and of all animal products about 4 per cent lower than a year ago. Much of the increase in prices for crop products is due to higher prices for tobacco, hay, corn, and wheat. Dairy products have lost purchasing power, although the general average of prices is slightly higher.

On the whole, farm product prices were rated at 113 per cent of "parity" at mid-September, down one point from mid-August and 5 points below September 1943.

Breithaupt also called attention to some significant relationships between trends in farm real estate prices and net farm income. Five times in the past 33 years, the figures show, the trend of land prices has followed a change in the trend of net farm income in about a year, he said.

Common Sense Urged Is Placing Furniture

Ordinary common sense is the most important principle in arranging furniture so that each piece is placed for most convenient use, attractiveness and clear lanes of traffic, suggests Lois A. Lutz, extension specialist in home management at Oregon State college.

Balance may be achieved by distributing furniture and color so that fairly equal masses are placed at the sides and end of the room, she says. Interests and needs of the family will determine furniture groupings.

Large pieces of furniture and rugs are usually placed parallel with the walls, according to Miss Lutz. Smaller pieces may be placed to fill in and give a more informal feeling. Large pieces placed across the corner create "dead" corners and waste space. She suggests an inside wall for the piano, if possible. Wise use of color and placing

furniture out a few inches from the wall will often make very large rooms appear smaller, she adds.
