317 X This is the "Little Townsend bill. While the writer is and has long been in favor of adequate old age pensions, we do not like the way this bill is drawn. Nor do we favor a gross income tax. Such a tax would bankrupt many a small business man. And there is one clause in the bill which condemns it, so far as we are concerned. This

is the section (No. 16) which would limit the power of the PEOPLE of Oregon from ever voting a certain kind of law. Any bill which would limit the people from voting for ANY darned law they pleased will never have our support.

This small levy, which will add one mill annually to your taxes for a period of three years, is a pay-as-you-go proposition and a very worthy one. 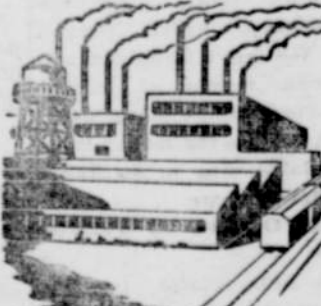
