South America As Seen by Local Lady

Mrs. Mildred Swain is writing to her mother, Mrs. E. E. Scott, from South America, where she is with her husband, who is employed by the government rubber research.

Continued from last week

As soon as news of the tragedy reached Manaus a searching party was organized to verify the survivor's story and in the vain hope that some of the four might still be living and waiting for help. Also the Captain of the American Army here was obligated to make every effort to ascertain if the two officers were legally dead or must be reported missing.

It is interesting to note that Dr. Alberto Pizarra Jacobina, Chief of the Protective Service to Indians of this State, a Brazilian and not an Indian, of Manaus, was definitely against any kind of investigating party making a trip and did everything in his power to prevent it. It should be pointed out also that at his request and in accordance with his instructions, Lt. Williamson and Sgt. Bates had left their side-arms in the bottom of their canoe and were consequently unarmed and defenseless when attacked by the Indians. Dr. Jacobina had stated that the Indians were not hostile and that guns would make them so.

Use twine—not wire

NEWSPAPERS Fold them flat (the way the paper boy sells them) and tie them in bundles about 8 inches high.

CORRUGATED and CARD-BOARD BOXES and CARTONS. Flatten them out in bundles about 8 inches high.

MAGAZINES and BOOKS: Tie them in bundles about 8 inches high.

WASTEBASKET PAPER (WRAPPERS, ENVELOPES, Etc.): Flatten and pack down in a box or bundle, so that it can be carried.
