Trout Fishing on Rogue To Open May 5

The Oregon State Game Commission, at a hearing held Saturday, January 13 in Portland, gave tentative consideration to the 1945 angling regulations. The final order of adoption will be made when the hearing is reconvened on January 27.

The major change considered is in the opening date of the general season for trout over six inches. For the counties west of the summit of the Cascade Range the season is set for April 14 to October 31. This season will apply also to Baker, Union, Walla and Umatilla counties. For other counties east of the summit, the season will be May 12 to October 31. Special seasons, however, are provided for numerous lakes and streams and are listed in the regulations for each county. The exceptions include a season of April 28 to October 31 for that part of the Deschutes River below the diversion dam at Bend and an opening date of May 5 for the Rogue River.

The bag limit for trout over six inches in length is the same as last year, 15 fish but not more than 15 pounds and 1 fish in any one day, or 30 fish but not more than 30 pounds and 2 fish in possession or in any seven consecutive days.

The general regulations for salmon and steelhead remain the same. Winter fishing for cutthroat trout over ten inches in length will be allowed in coastal waters west of Highway 99, with certain exceptions. Bag limit is the same as before, 3 a day or 6 in 7 consecutive days or in possessions.

No changes were made in the regulations affecting jack salmon, striped bass, shad, sturgeon or spiny-rayed fish, except that bass fishing will be allowed the year around in Munsel, Sutton and Mercer lakes.
