Coast Guards Needs More 17-year-olds

Recruiting of 17-year-old youths by the U.S. Coast Guard has been extended for an indefinite period of at least several months' duration, it is announced by Chief Yeoman L. Puckett, in charge of the Coast Guard Recruiting Station at 806 S.W. Morrison St., Portland.

The extension replaces the month-to-month quota basis upon which the 17-year-old recruiting program has operated since its resumption four months ago.

"The Coast Guard wants 1000 17-year-old-recruits monthly," Chief Puckett said, "and is relying on Oregon and southwest Washington to furnish a goodly percentage of that total. This section has had one of the finest records in the nation in past years as a source of volunteers for Coast Guard service, and has supplied a high type of enlisted and officer personnel."

An applicant for enlistment in the Coast Guard must be 17, an American citizen, have a copy of his birth certificate, parent's consent, be at least 5 feet, 4 inches and weigh not less than 120 pounds. Educational requirements include one year of high school, except in the case of applicants for enlistment as steward's mates, for whom completion of the eighth grade is sufficient. Application may be made in person or by letter at the Coast Guard Recruiting Station, 806 S.W. Morrison, Portland 5, Oregon.

Gold Hill Trapper Winner of Award

Opals Greer, a well known trapper from Gold Hill, Jackson County, is a winner of a daily award in the Sixteenth National Fur Show conducted by the Raw Fur Marketing Service of Sears, Roebuck and Co.

County Council P.-T.A. Discuss Many Problems at Medford Meeting

Alcoholics Anonymous, a unique society organized in 1934 by a sot, who cured himself, and by his discovery, has aided 15,000 others to overcome their alcoholism, was described by Mrs. A. H. Puhl. To qualify for membership one must be an alcoholic with a desire to overcome the habit. We must all learn that an alcoholic is a sick person. Only

someone who has been an alcoholic can understand and help him.

Mrs. Hershel Obye of Grants Pass, District President of the Oregon State P.T.A. gave an interesting report on a meeting for state officers, held in Portland recently. Tying in with the discussion on alcoholism, was her explanation of a bill being prepared for state legislation to treat alcoholics as sick people, rather than law breakers. A "clinic's sentence" rather than all would get at the cause for the offense. Need for such legislation has been emphasized by four deaths in Portland's "drunk tank" within the past week. One was an honorably discharged soldier who had spent three years in the Pacific.

Other legislative measures to study were those effecting our milk supply; methods for raising revenue to support public schools, whose attendance show an increase all over the state; and compulsory military training during peacetime.

Mrs. H. D. Byington asked that members make use of the material assembled by the league of women voters, on the conferences at Dumbarton Oaks. A special shelf has been provided at the Medford public library to hold this material.
