We are sending home movie films No. 22, 23 and 24. The first five feet of No. 22 was already taken prior to leaving on this trip.

The footage starting with the picture of the Pan-Air do Brazil float and plane is the beginning of this series of pictures. You will notice, if your scribe is any kind of a photographer, a good old stern—paddle-wheel boat which was tied up at the dock. In all cases on these rivers when a person has the audacity to mention a "dock" he means the river bank which, of times, is from one to fifteen inches deep in mud. I also took pictures of three R.D.C. Higgins launches tied up together. These boats are used by our Rubber Technicians in travelling up and down the rivers contacting the various seringallistas, owners of land on which rubber trees are found. I took several pictures of the town of Boca do Acre and also of a trip up the Rio Acre to one of our warehouses.

We over-nighted in Boca do Acre with all of us swinging hammocks on the Higgins launches and very comfortably weathering a heavy night rain.

During the night the river rose between three and four feet which is not uncommon in this territory since oftentimes they will raise ten feet during the night.
