

School Tournament To Be Held Feb. 22, 23, 24

The annual "B" school basketball tournament will be held in the Medford High School gymnasium on February 22, 23, and 24. There will be eight teams in this tournament and the winner will play the following week against the Klamath-Lake County champion. Seven of the ten teams in Jackson County together with Kerby, the Josephine County representative, will compete in this tournament at Medford. A preliminary playoff will be held in the Central Point gym Monday, February nineteenth for the purpose of eliminating three of the ten teams of the county. The six teams with the lowest conference rating will compete Monday night. From the present standing it is probable that these teams will be Phoenix, Gold Hill, St. Marys, Eagle Point, Butte Falls and Prospect.

In the tournament there will be four games Thursday probably starting about 3 p.m., two games Friday evening and two games Saturday evening.

"A" School Takes 43-32 Beating

The Central Point High hoopers maintained their record of no defeats by outscoring Grants Pass, of the "A" school circuit, 43 to 32, on the Cavemen court last Saturday night.

This was the Pointers' second win over the Cavemen this season, each time by an eleven point margin.

Grants Pass, who did not start their regular five, were forced to put in their best men in the second quarter, in an effort to keep up with the Pointer scoring. But the Pointer's attack continued successfully, giving them a 25-20 lead at half-time.

In the second half, the Pointers started playing slow, careful ball, shooting only set shots and not allowing the Cavemen to break away with
