After the ladies left, the meeting was formally opened in due form and the business of the evening taken up. The most important business was the choosing of a site for the new memorial Legion building which the post hopes to build in the near future. Several sites had been proposed. Site No. 1 was offered by the city across the railroad, the post to choose the site either on West Main street or on North Haskell street and was to consist of one-half acre taken from the city tract in that part of town.

Site No. 2 consisted of the quarter block at the corner of Manzanita and Second streets in the rear of the old Theiss building, and now owned by Jackson county. Site No. 3 was a lot on East Pine street, directly across from the Grange hall, also owned by the county, and the adjoining corner lot owned by the city. Site No. 4 was the old blacksmith shop property on Pine street, just east of the fire hall.

After much discussion of the advantages and disadvantages of the various sites a vote was taken to decide which site the building committee was to endeavor to secure. During this discussion Vice-commander Powell expressed his opposition to the proposed site across the tracks on account of its being too far out of town, beyond the street

lighting system or sidewalks. He said he thought that if the Ladies' Auxiliary of the post should be organized as hoped, the ladies would not like the idea of having to go so far along dark country roads to reach their hall. Ray Watkins spoke for the sportsmen's club and stated that in his opinion the proposed use of part of the grounds in this site as a baseball ground for junior baseball would be very dangerous when the club was using their trap-shooting facilities, which was really the purpose of the club's building and ground leased from the city.

Various members of the post spoke in favor of the site of their choice and the vote was then taken. The results of the vote was as follows: Site No. 1, 4; Site No. 2, 16; Site No. 3, 13; Site No. 4, 1. Site No. 2, or the East Pine street site, was declared chosen. On motion the officers of the post were instructed to get in touch with the city officials and county court to see on what terms the site could be procured.

The invitation of the sportsmen's club for the post to hold its future meetings until their own building is ready in the club's building west of town was accepted. The post expressed its appreciation of the courtesy shown them by Comrade Ross in allowing them to meet in the hall above the confectionery since the post was organized. This hall was condemned some time ago by the state fire marshal on account of the fire risk so cannot be used regularly.
