South America As Seen by Local Lady

These workers are transported by S.A.V.A. to such interior towns as Rio Branco where they are supposed to find employment for themselves. After arriving at their final destination they are given one day and on half's food and then must shift for themselves. It was impossible to take any pictures of this camp due to the darkness since it was under roof.

As mentioned above we left Rio Branco at 7:20 A.M. bound for Villa Feijo and as I sat in the plane writing up a few notes, once again we caught fire in the electrical connections in the Pilot's compartment. I say once again since on my trip to Altamira some weeks ago this same thing happened and we were forced to turn back for Manaus. Why does everything happen to me? We threw a fuse and got the short stopped without serious damage. During this time we were flying at approximately 10,000 feet.

We landed at Villa Feijo at 9:30 A.M. on the 24th, did our work and took off at 4:00 P.M. the same day. Villa Feijo is a new town only approximately ten years old. The houses look as if they have been there forever with the only thing new being a few concrete sidewalks. We had lunch with the Prefeito and I took only ten feet of film here, this being film No. 24.

As mentioned above, we took off at 4:00 P.M. (same day), heading northeast on Latitude 70 for Joao Pessoa, now called Elrunepé. Joao Pessoa is on the Rio Jurua.

Henry F. Borah, 85, Passes to Reward

The following announcement of the death and funeral of Mr. Henry Borah, was accidentally overlooked last week. We feel like it will be of interest to his many friends.

Henry F. Borah, a resident of Central Point for the past 14 years, died at a local hospital Thursday, April 5, following a short illness. He had made his home with Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Cassman of Central Point for the past eight years. Mrs. Cassman was a niece of Mr. Borah.

Mr. Borah was born February 12, 1860, in Wisconsin, and came to the state of Oregon in 1928, and during most of that time has been engaged in orchard work. In 1895 he was united to Lilly Smith, in South Dakota, and to this union was born one son. Mrs. Borah died some years later and he was married to Clara Iartig. He is survived by two sons, Melvin E., Klamath Falls, and Harry G., San Luis Obispo, Calif.; a sister, Mrs. William Lewis, Millbanks, South Dakota, also six grandchildren. Funeral services were at the Perl Funeral home Wednesday, April 11. Rev. Gilbert E. Cays of Central Point officiated and interment was in Sisydon Memorial Park.

Mr. Borah had made many friends in Central Point. He was a very industrious and exceptionally good workman. He had built several houses during his time here, finishing one of them shortly before his death.

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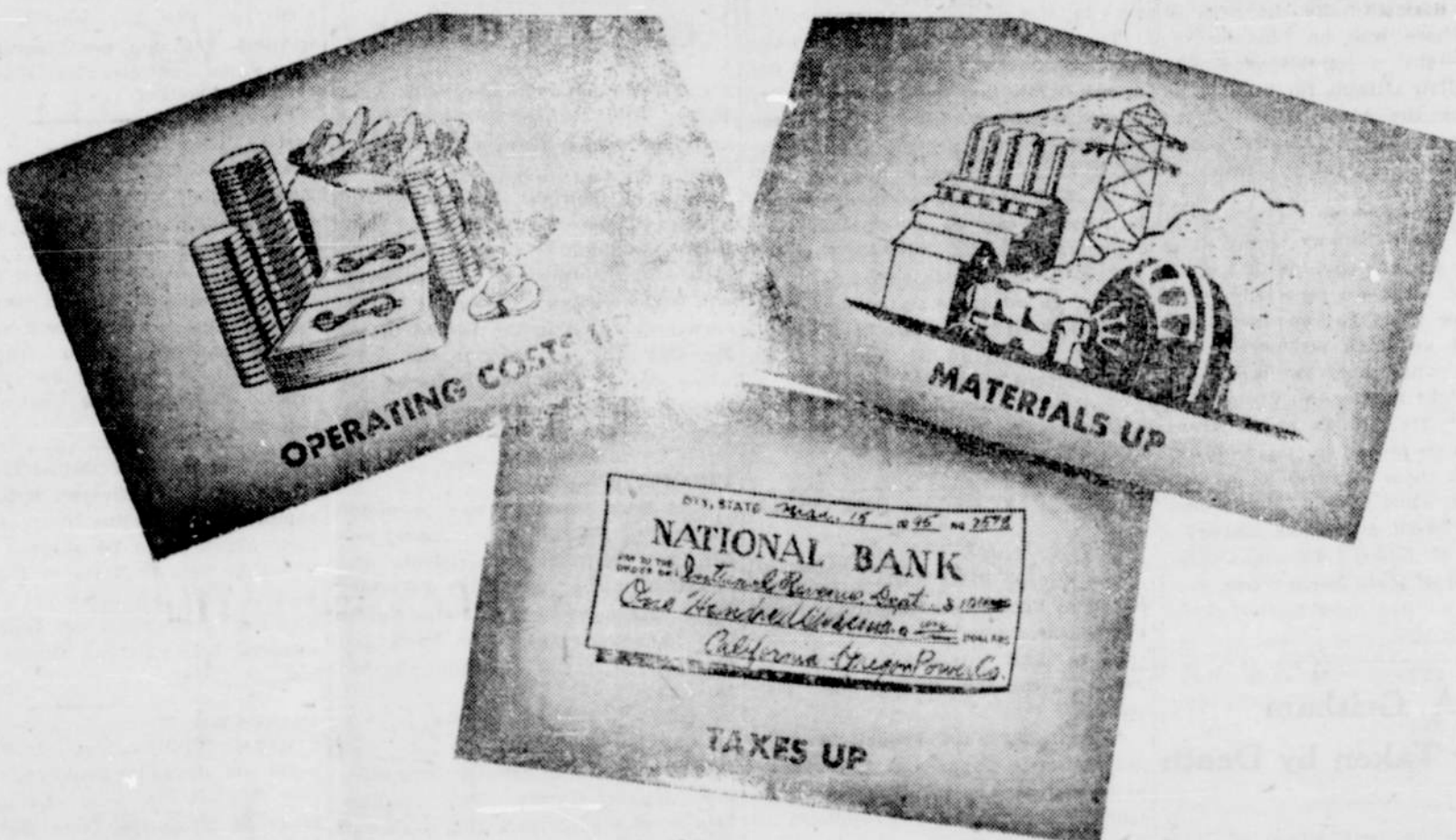
