South America As Seen by Local Lady

Mrs. Mildred Swain is writing to her mother, Mrs. E. E. Scott, from South America, where she is with her husband, who is employed by the government rubber research.

Continued from last week

We circled Benjamin Constant in a ten mile circle flying over Leticia, Colombia and Tabatinga, Peru, landing at Benjamin Constant at 3:00 P.M. November 25th. R.D.C. warehouses at this town are built on two large barges which is very sensible due to the extreme fluctuation in water levels of these rivers.

I neglected to mention our last breakfast way back at Rio Branco which consisted of a large can of pineapple juice which Micki thoughtfully made me carry. Our lunch today in flight was a can of Vienna Sausages, known to you as weiners. Once again Micki made me carry these.

We had dinner the night of the 25th and breakfast the morning of the 26th on board the barges as guests of the R.D.C. agent and finished our work on Sunday morning, the 26th. I took fifteen feet of pictures in Benjamin Constant showing at Colombian boat, the R.D.C. barges and general photographs of the town.

We took off from Benjamin Constant Sunday morning at 10:40 A.M. heading for Tefte which is a Pan Air do Brazil station and only a gas stop for us. In my notes I have written "landed at Tefte" 1:15 P.M. much I hope. Off the water at 2:00 P.M. Nope! We did, however, manage to buy three cans of sardines and three small, very small loaves of bread. I was tempted to follow the biblical story about the loaves and fishes but unwilling to trust my luck too far.

I took the last ten feet of film at Tefte showing the plane, panorama

of the town and the water line and also some of the passengers boarding the plane. As mentioned, we took off at 2:00 P.M. and landed that same afternoon—Sunday—the 26th, in Manaus. Micki and I had a race to the airport—she in a taxi and I in an airplane, both arriving at the airport at 4:20 P.M. In circling the town I could see the cab going out the one road for the airport and figured it had to be Micki. Upon landing she informed me that we beat our estimated arrival time by twenty-five minutes allowing her only ten minutes to get a cab and get out to the port.

And so, once again, I return to Manaus and, I hope, remain for some spell.

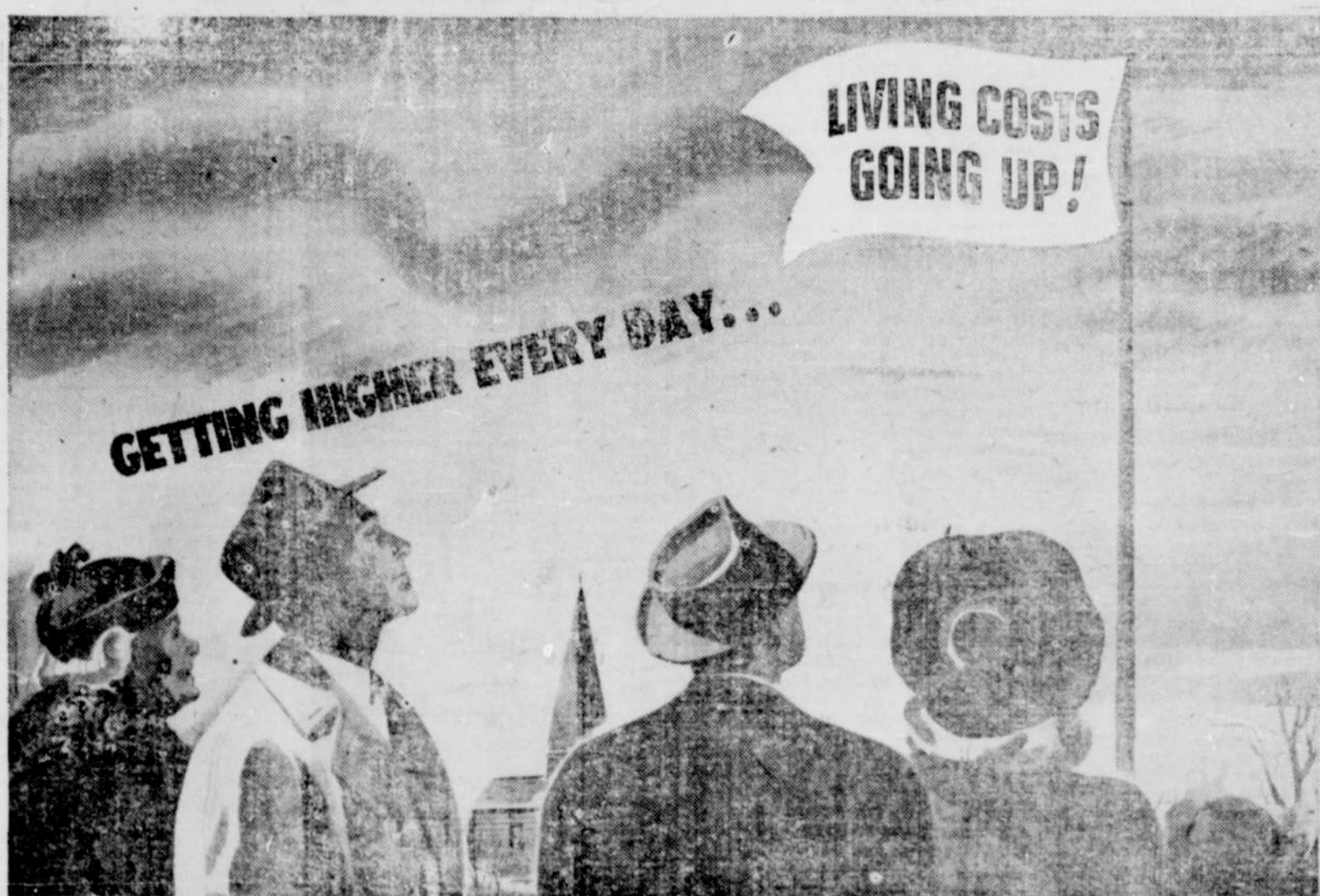

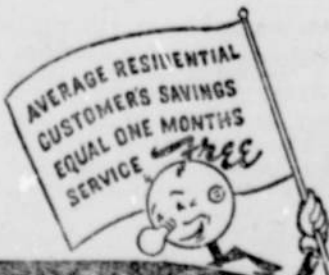
