South America As Seen by Local Lady

Mrs. Mildred Swain is writing to her mother, Mrs. E. E. Scott, from South America, where she is with her husband, who is employed by the government rubber research.

Continued from last week

The R.D.C. Station wagon picked us up early one morning and took us to the Sao Paulo train Station where we caught our train to Petropolis, the beautiful residential town up in the mountains back of Rio. It was a most interesting trip and the train was terrible. We brushed soot all the way and looked like colored folks when we arrived but I wouldn't have missed it. All the windows on the train were open and the cars are wooden and dirty with straw seats. They have small engines just the height of the small coaches and they go putt-putting along spitting out cinders and soot which drifts back into the coaches. We were in the first coach behind the engine, of course. When we reached the foot of the last mountain out of Petropolis the train was broken up into two coaches each and one engine. The engine got behind and pushed the two coaches up the mountain and we were fortunate enough to be in the first of such a section and could look back down the hairpin curves and see two little coaches and an engine, two more little coaches and an engine, as far back as we could see. Arrived at Petropolis about

11:00 A.M. and immediately made arrangements to come back by bus that evening at 5:30. Took a bus to the beautiful Hotel Quitandinha which is the world's largest hotel. Believe I have told you about that. It has a hand-dug lake in front of it and swimming and boating, also riding and tennis. There is a pavilion and everything you could wish for. The hotel is simply luxury at the highest, pastel colors and modernistic finish. It houses movie theatres, casino, ice-skating, roller-skating, dancing, a children's section even to a separate dining room with miniature furnishings, etc., and everything you could wish for under one roof. I have sent some movies home of this hotel.

Arrived back in Rio that evening in time for dinner at the Gloria at 9:00 P.M. and were tired but had a most enjoyable day. Mabel did some shopping this trip in Rio and I went to the lovely shops again with her. One noon we had lunch with a gang of girls from RDC and they suggested we look at Rio's newest hotel, The Serrador, which we did. We moved in there the next day as it is right down town and the transportation problem is something if you get caught in rush hours. We had been forced to walk to the Gloria a couple of times and since "it is not the custom" for unattended girls to walk alone we decided to move. The Serrador is lovely and our room was as large as an apartment with one end being used as a bedroom and the other end of the room as a living room with overstuffed furniture. The rates were about the same as the Gloria.
