## Hunting Regulations Set for This Year

The 1945 hunting regulations tentatively were set for the Oregon State Game Commission when it held its annual hearing in Portland on July 14. The hearing was adjourned until July 28 at which time the final regulations will be passed.

There will be no special cow elk tags issued this year although the same area in southeastern Oregon will be open to the hunting of elk of either sex on the regular elk tag. The elk season will be from November 3 to 25, inclusive, but that part of the state west of the summit of Cascade Range will be closed to hunting with the exception of the eastern half of Lane county.

The deer season will be open from September 29 to October 28 for buck deer having not less than forked horns. There will be no special doe deer tags issued except 800 tags for a post-season shoot to be held in the Fort Rock-Silver Lake area from December 1 to 5, inclusive. The fees for these tags are \$3.50 for residents and \$5 for nonresidents. In addition to the regular hunting license fees,

There also will be issued 800 tags for the taking of antelope with ear-length horns. The season will be from September 22 to 30, inclusive. Fees for antelope tags are \$2.50 for residents and \$5 for nonresidents.

Drawings for both the doe deer and antelope tags will be held at dates to be published later if the number of applications exceed the number of tags authorized.

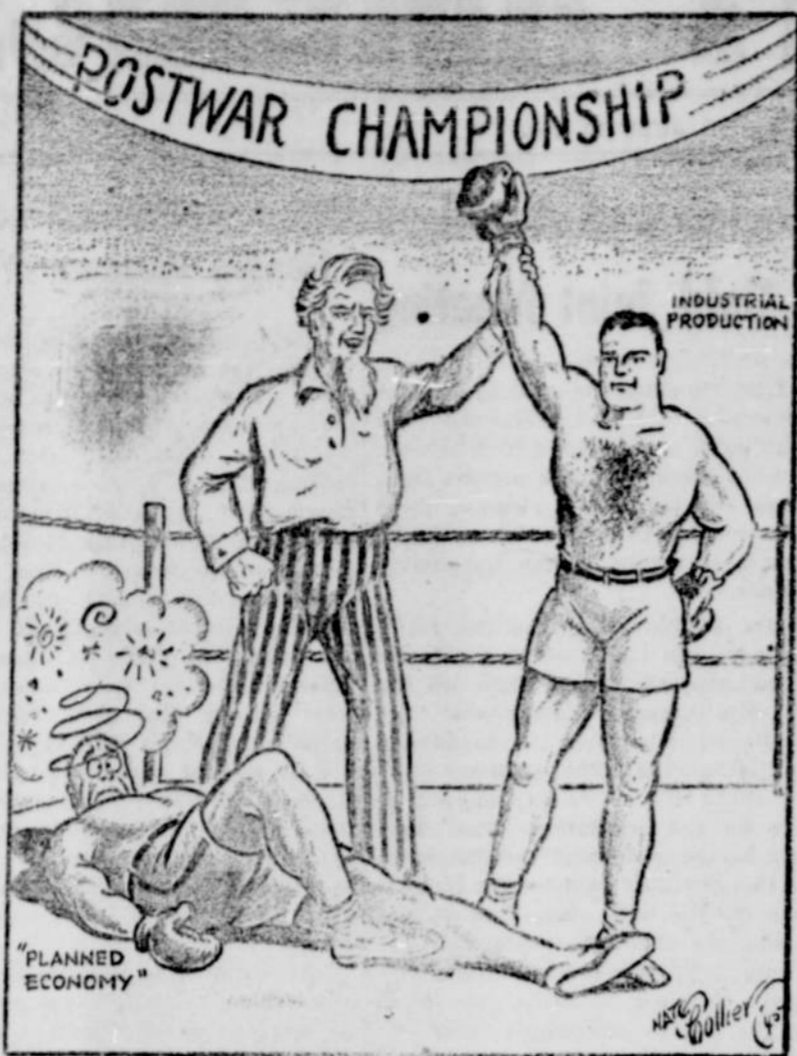
## Citizens Urge Council To Take Action on Water

Mr. Don Faber was then called upon and spoke passionately of the need for immediate action and said that he believed that a vast majority of the citizens of the town were in favor of the Medford water proposition. He then presented the petitions which had been left for signature in various business places about the city. He called attention to the fact that while a number of signers did not live in the immediate city, yet they were all people who were interested in the city or had business places here.

A number of other speakers were called upon, including Mr. E. C. Faber, who told of his long endeavor to get Medford water for this city and that he hoped this time something would be done. Commissioner Powell was called upon by Mayor Scott to give some facts and figures about the estimated cost of such a system. Mr. Powell stated that in

338 he had led the fight to get Medford water and that at that time the engineer had estimated the cost of the project at \$34,000. He also called attention to the condition of the present water mains and stated that he believed that at least 25% of the water being pumped out of the city wells daily was being wasted through innumerable leaks in the system.

Mr. Powell called attention to the type of contract which he thought could be made with the city of Medford and stated that there seemed to be some misapprehension as to the terms. He said that while it is true that actual residents of Medford are on a flat rate of \$2.50 per month and are not restricted as to the amount of water they may use, the contracts now in existence between Medford and the various districts now getting water from the Medford system call for a monthly rate of \$2.50 for a minimum of 5000 gallons, plus 20c per thousand gallons above that minimum. He said he understood that the same rates would apply to this city in case we should be able to get Medford water at all.

M. Powell strongly urged that the building of new distributing mains should be included in any project undertaken. He said that in his opinion there were three things which should be done—rebuild the distributing system to get rid of the leaks; put in at least a ten-inch main to connect with the Medford system, and build a sewage disposal system. He estimated that such a plan would cost the city at least \$150,000, but that with interest rates being what they are at present, such an indebtedness would not be too serious a load for a growing city such as ours to carry.

A large delegation of citizens attended the meeting and all seemed to favor immediate action in calling a bond election. After all had been heard who desired to express an opinion, Mayor Scott appointed James Cummings, chairman of the water committee of the council, and Don Faber, to fill the vacancies on the local water commission. Everett Faber informed the mayor that he had contacted the chairman of the Medford commission Tuesday afternoon and that he had been told that the commission would have a meeting Wednesday noon and would be glad to have a delegation from the local commission meet with them.

Mr. Faber said he was informed that there was a good prospect that Medford would make a contract with this city as soon as the new reservoir now being constructed by the city of Medford is completed, which is expected to be about the first of December of this year.
