

New Friends Church To Be Dedicated Sun.

The Friends Church in Medford (Quakers) now building its new brick chapel at the corner of the Old Pacific Highway and DeBarr Avenue at Midway Road, will dedicate the first unit of the church on next Sunday afternoon at 3 P.M., according to Milo C. Ross, Pastor. The program for the day follows:

The morning sessions will continue over this Sunday at the Howard School, Sunday School at 10 o'clock, with a demonstration of the work of the Vacation Bible School. At 11 A.M. service, Frederick B. Baker, pastor of the Camas, Wash., church will preach. Baker is a leading Friends pastor and at the present time, superintendent of all the churches of the denomination in the Portland area, and secretary of the Northwest section of the National Association of Evangelicals.

A dinner will be served on the parsonage lawn at 12:30 followed by the laying of the cornerstone at 2:30. Paul S. Camack, clerk of Salem Quarterly Meeting, will lead in this ceremony, assisted by Oscar H. Brown, superintendent of the Salem Churches; and Forest Camack, also of this district.

The dedication proper will occur at 3 o'clock, at which time Joseph G. Reece, general superintendent of the denomination, will deliver the dedicatory address. Dr. Gervais A. Carey of Dundee, Presiding Clerk of Oregon Yearly Meeting and Professor of Religion at Pacific College, will assist. Music for the afternoon will be provided by Miss Alfreda Martin, now of Corvallis, and at one time director of The Medford Church music; and the combined choirs of the Talent and Medford Churches, directed by George Bales of Talent. The local pastor will lead in reading of the responses and the reception of new members.

The young people of the church will be addressed at 7 P.M. by Paul Cammack, who has just been named traveling secretary of the Friends Christian Endeavor Union.

The evening service will be given to moving and still pictures of the work of the church, both in the Northwest and in Central and South America, and to scenes of the most recent young people's camps.

The church will remain open constantly for some weeks ahead in order that people generally can visit, or go in to worship. Of special interest in the construction has been the combination of the Gothic style of architecture as typified in the English parish churches, and the use of modern materials.

Two original murals, one depicting the Christ talking to children of several nationalities, and the other on the walls of the mother's room and showing Noah's Ark and the animals, will be unveiled at the afternoon service. Miss Dana Platz, young Medford artist, has executed this work.

Homer McAdams, Mrs. Wendell Votaw, Nelson B. Hull, Floyd Ditch and Dana W. Bowers have served as the building committee.

The Rev. Harry Hansen, pastor of the church, read the marriage vows at 3 o'clock before about 100 friends and relatives of the couple. The church was decorated with white gladioli, lilies and baby breath, and tapers were lit preceding the ceremony by Miss Donna Lee Ross, niece of Sgt. Casebeer, and Miss Betty Lou Baker.

The bride was given in marriage by her father, and wore a white satin dress with long train and finger tip veil, held in place by a crown. She carried a bouquet of white roses and stephanotis.

The couple left on a two-week trip to the coast near Crescent City, Calif., and on their return Sgt. Casebeer will report to Santa Barbara for reassignment.

Both were graduated from Medford high school with the class of 1944, and Sgt. Casebeer entered the army in June last year. He went overseas in the fall, and was taken prisoner by the Germans in February, while fighting on the European front. The sergeant was liberated when Germany surrendered, and just recently returned to this country.

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Point Value of Butter Now 16

The red point value of creamery butter dropped from 24 to 16 points a pound at midnight last Saturday night.

The Office of Price Administration, announcing the cut, said the point value of farm or country butter and process butter will remain unchanged at 12 points a pound.

The reduction in the creamery butter point value was decided upon, OPA said, because of reduced military requirements for August and to prevent accumulations of butter in cold storage houses. The OPA warned that if supplies are exhausted too fast the ration value will have to be increased.

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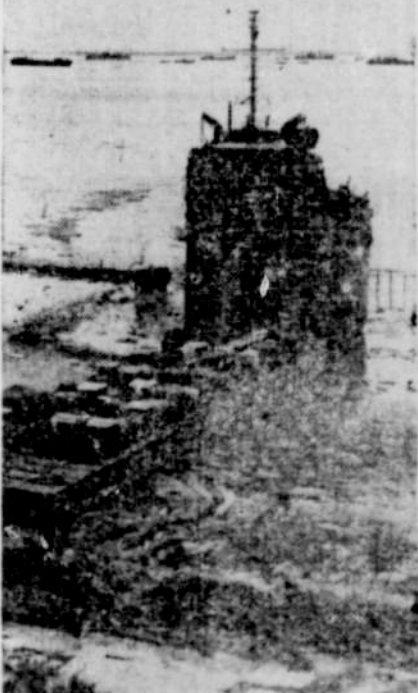
