EDITORIALS

YOU CAN HELP NOW

If you find it difficult to get on a train, remember that the railroads and the Pullman Company, by order of the Office of Defense Transportation, have withdrawn from service all sleeping cars operating between points 450 miles or less apart. The action was made necessary by unexpectedly heavy arrivals of troops from Europe.

This action makes available an additional 895 Pullman cars and gives the military the exclusive use of about half the sleeping cars operating in the United States. These cars afford a greater measure of comfort to our troops moving to the west coast prior to embarkation to the Pacific theatre.

It is interesting to note that in 1918, with a total of approximately 41,000 coaches and sleeping cars, the railroads performed 42,676,000,000 passenger-miles of service.

In 1944, with approximately 27,700 passenger-carrying cars, the railroads performed 95,575,000,000 passenger-miles and the 1945 passenger load is expected to mount 10 per cent, to more than 100,000,000,000 passenger-miles, or nearly two and one-half times the 1918 passenger load—to be moved in 30 per cent less passenger carrying equipment.

On account of wartime restrictions, the railroads have been unable to buy passenger carrying cars. The hauling job and the maintenance job they have done with the equipment at hand is almost beyond belief. They have rendered service more expeditiously, more courteously and with less waste than in 1918 when there was vastly more equipment, more engines and much more manpower.

You can do your part to help out in the greatest transportation job in history by traveling only when necessary for purposes other than pleasure.

STORE CUSTOMERS AT FAULT

If you talk to the clerks in chain stores, you will find that a lot of supposedly good Americans give scant consideration to the truth in making purchases. As shortages of necessities grow more acute, many such stores have tried to carry out a voluntary rationing program so that all persons can get a share with out the annoyance and compulsion of ration stamps. Clerks who are trained to be courteous are pushed around by customers who insist upon getting scarce articles of food, wearing apparel, smokes, etc.

"Some of our best people are the worst liars," said one clerk. "For example, we have tried to voluntarily apportion eggs, ladies' hose, cigarettes, etc., to each customer. Many people who I know have received their allotment early in the week insisting that they haven't made such purchases. While we know they have received their quota, we get called down if we question their veracity."

Voluntary action by retailers, in which they must have the cooperation of the public, can avert much compulsory rationing which is so distasteful to the average citizen. But it must be a two-way proposition—the customer must cooperate with the store.

Chain stores with many outlets and a uniform policy are leaders in promoting voluntary rationing. The consumer should help in his own best interest.

SALADS FOR SUMMER MEALS

Salad reaches the height of distinction when the combination of ingredients are well chosen, when they are attractively arranged, and when the dressing best brings out the flavors combined in the salad.

The materials are chosen according to the place the salad is to occupy on the menu. Salads may be light or they may be very substantial—served as the first course, as the main dish, or even as dessert.

The most attractive salads are remarkable for their simplicity. Keep the greens green and the ingredients uniform in size and large enough to retain their identity.

A summer salad favorite is cottage cheese. Salads in which cottage cheese is combined with fruits and vegetables make satisfactory main dishes when accompanied by hot buttered rolls and a beverage. The cheese may be seasoned with salt and pepper, with a bit of mayonnaise, or with chili sauce, chives or catsup. Plain onion juice is a good seasoner.

When you use fruits or vegetables in your summer salads remember that they are most appetizing and nutritious when fresh, so store them in the refrigerator and use as soon as you can after buying or picking from your victory garden.

You can't have too many ideas for salad dressings up your sleeve. Here are two we know you will want to try:

Cream Dressing for Cole Slaw
1/4 cup thick sour or sweet cream
2 tablespoons sugar
1/4 cup vinegar
Few drops onion juice
1/8 teaspoon salt
Pepper
1 quart cabbage, finely shredded
Combine first six ingredients; beat. Pour over cabbage. Mix well and serve at once. Serves 6 to 8.

Sour Cream Dressing
1 cup thick sour cream
2 teaspoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup peanut butter
Paprika
3 tablespoons vinegar
Mix all ingredients together; beat or whip until smooth.
