was used to scatter out the huge pile of sawdust from the storage bin so the water would penetrate the mass. Not until the last spark was extinguished did Fire Chief Tharp and his men quit the job.

Loss from the fire is estimated at about \$80,000.00, with a coverage of about 60% insurance. Mr. Francis Cheney yesterday stated that the company would start rebuilding the mill at once. The company owns several tracts of timber in southern Oregon. Their main business is the manufacture and purchase of railroad ties and the stud mill just destroyed was used to manufacture two-by-fours, car strips, lath cross arms for telephone poles and the like from the outside portions of the logs. The best railroad ties are made from the heart of the trees. The company owns several of these stud mills in the Northwest and suffered the loss by fire of one of their mills at Tacoma only last week.
