We have better water than some places that I have heard of but not enough of it and apparently no possibility of getting enough from wells. But granting that we have fairly good water, we have an opportunity now of getting much better water and after all good or bad is by comparison. This water is drinkable but as compared with the water we are voting on, it is not good.

There is one question that I often hear asked: What will the Medford water cost the consumer? The answer is \$1.00 per month more than you are now paying. For example if your water bill was \$1.50 this month it would have been \$2.50 if it had been Medford water. If during irrigation season your bill is \$4.50 it will be \$5.50 etc.—One dollar per month more—no more nor no less.

Do you believe the saving on soap, the saving on plumbing, the convenience of soft water in laundrying and the easy keeping the bath tub white, and the prospect of greener, prettier lawns for the community in general is worth \$1.00 per month more than you are now paying? It is not my purpose to tell you how to vote. That is your pleasure, privilege, and duty. I am simply giving you some of the reasons why I intend to vote yes for more, better, and softer water.
