American Legion Offers Veterans Many Services

The lot of every veteran of World War II is immeasurably better today because of The American Legion. It was The American Legion which through its efforts over 26 years built up the great structure of federal and state veterans' legislation, the splendid government hospital systems, and the recognition that the rehabilitation of men and women physically, mentally and economically wrecked by service in war is as much a part of the cost of war as building battleships, planes and tanks.

The American Legion also established the principal of veterans' preference in civil service jobs. The Legion's greatest direct contribution to the fighting men and women of this war was its successful sponsorship in Congress of the G.I. Bill of Rights. This bill, of course, was not perfect when passed. It pioneered in a few fields of legislation. The Legion is now sponsoring amendments to improve administration of the law. But this legislation has opened doors of opportunity to the veterans of this war which the veterans of no other American war even dreamed about.

With its vast backlog of knowledge, experience and the know-how of accomplishing things, The American Legion is an important organization to all veterans of this war. They can do no better than take it over, lock, stock and barrel—it's theirs for the asking. The Legion now numbers half a million World War II men and women in its ranks. By the natural process of evolution it will become more and more a World War II organization. The men and women of this war have it in their power to make it the most powerful organization in the country's history for their own good and that of God and Country.

Veterans of World War II have an opportunity which has never been accorded to veterans of any of our other wars in all our history—they can, if they will, inherit The American Legion.

This is a heritage beyond the value of rubies and pearls.

Never before have the veterans of an American war been offered an opportunity to take over lock, stock and barrel a prosperous and powerful going concern like The American Legion. It has a local branch—its Post—at almost every crossroads in the Nation. It is worth probably more than \$100,000,000 in club houses, investment funds, building funds, trust funds and restricted funds and endowments. It numbers among its membership the leaders in all walks of life from the White House down to the village constable. It has the experience and know-how for getting things done and cutting through red tape. Above all, it is

dedicated to the welfare and best interests of veterans, their dependents, and the country.

The American Legion offers the returning veterans of this war the assurance of a powerful organization at the time they need it most—when they come home from war. It also offers them the assurance that in The American Legion they will never be exploited.

All that World War II veterans need to take over the American Legion is to assume some responsibility—the responsibility of carrying on the Legion's great programs for God and country.
