Irrigation Projects In Valley Indicate Future

Gravity irrigation projects in the Willamette valley are proving successful under present conservative plans of operation, but there is as yet no indication of a demand by farmers for full irrigation of all or nearly all of their crop land, conclude research of the O.S.C. agriculture experiment station after detailed studies of two western Oregon gravity projects.

The two projects studied and now reported on in station circular 168, are the McKenzie and Muddy Creek irrigation projects in Lane and Linn counties. Both projects are in sound financial condition with little debt, the investigators found.

So far the chief large scale use of irrigation water on these projects has been for irrigated ladino clover pastures for dairy cows. Practically all farms have some irrigated pasture, but practically all grow hay, seed and similar crops without irrigations. Truck crop irrigation in river bottom land is chiefly from pumps.

The authors, E. L. Potter, Alexander Joss, D. Curtis Mumford and H. L. Thomas, conclude that prospect for large scale irrigation expansion beyond pasture needs depends mostly on whether the irrigation of alfalfa or clover for hay or silage can be made profitable under postwar conditions.

"The Reclamation Service might find it feasible to build a small project, sewer water to the users who wished it, and later expand the project as additional demand develops," the authors conclude.

HOT SCHOOL LUNCHES—

Hot plate lunches are now being served in several hundred Oregon grade schools as federal aid and other factors have served to increase interest, reports Miss Lucy A. Case, extension nutritionist at O.S.C. Miss Case has been assisting in a series of training schools for school lunch cooks throughout the state.

A four-point pattern for a good plate lunch suggested by Miss Case is a cup of whole milk in some form, a generous serving of vegetables, fruit or both; a serving of food rich in protein such as eggs, cheese, fish, meat, dried beans or peas or peanut butter, and a serving of whole grain or enriched bread or cereal.

A circular, HE 1890, giving school lunch menus and recipes is available from any extension office.
