NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Common Council of The City of Central Point will, on the 28th day of December, 1945, at the hour of 7:30 o'clock p.m., at the Common Council Chamber of The City of Central Point, Jackson County, Oregon offer for sale an issue of \$80,000.00 of bonds of The City of Central Point, being the heretofore duly authorized The City of Central Point General Obligation Water System Improvement Bonds, said bonds to be in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered 1 to 80, both inclusive, to be dated January 1, 1946, to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of \$4,000.00 per annum, on the 1st day of January of each of the years of 1949 to 1968, both inclusive; said bonds to bear interest at the rate of not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of July and January of each year, principal and interest payable at the office of the Treasurer of The City of Central Point, Central Point, Oregon.

Said bonds, or any thereof, not then matured, to be subject to redemption at par and accrued interest on the 1st day of January, 1956, or any interest paying date thereafter, upon publication, at least thirty days prior to contemplated redemption date, of one notice of intended redemption in a newspaper printed and published within Jackson County, Oregon.

Said bonds will be sold subject to the approving opinion of Messrs. Teal, Winfree, McCulloch, Shuler & Kelly, bond attorneys of Portland, Oregon; said bonds to be furnished and printed by The City of Central Point, Oregon; all bids must be in

writing, and all persons offering to purchase such bonds are invited to bid thereon at such rate of interest not exceeding three per cent (3%) per annum as they shall designate, and such bonds shall bear such rate of interest as shall be designated by the purchaser thereof, as aforesaid. Each bid shall be accompanied by tabulation of the bidder showing each of money to The City of Central Point under the bid. Sealed bids for the purchase of said bonds will be received by the Common Council at

the City Hall up to the date of said sale, as herein fixed. All bids must be accompanied with a certified check payable to The City of Central Point, in the sum of \$1,000.00.
