March of Dimes is Backed by Sports

Atting at an even higher score than the half million dollars raised last year through benefit events, the sports world goes all out for the 1946 March of Dimes, conducted by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, January 14-31.

Grantland Rice, national sports chairman for the seventh consecutive year, announces that plans have been formulated for sports events in every state and county.

With the able assistance of commentators Bob Considine and Bill Corum, a National Sports Committee of some 2,000 sports editors and columnists has been formed to assist campaign directors in handling local events throughout the country.

During the appeal period, January 14-31, bowling tournaments and match plays are scheduled for 10,000 alleys of the Bowlers Victory Legion.

In every field of sports, in every section of the country, activities are planned for the benefit of America's polio stricken youngsters.

Baseball, football, basketball, hockey, soccer, ice skating, roller skating, boxing, wrestling, swimming, tennis, golf, polo, ping pong, curling, badminton, squash, handball—all are on this list. Horse and dog shows and racing, fox hunts, shooting matches and billard matches, bridge tournaments and other recreations have been lined up to make winning plays.

This year again the sports world is all-out for the great March of Dimes.

Farm Families Plan To Buy Many Things

Farm families in one State alone want to buy 30,000 electric refrigerators and 20,000 electric washing machines in the next two years.

More than 9,000 plan to install heating systems in their homes; the average farmer expects to spend about \$1,000 in the next two years for household and farm equipment.

These results of a survey conducted by the extension service of Kansas State College are being cited to show American agriculture's intense interest in seeing industry get free and unhampered into the full production that will bring more goods to more people at lower costs.

Two-thirds of the Kansas farmers planning purchases said they would pay cash from current earnings or bank savings; only 8 per cent expect to make installment purchases.

Farm households put high on the list of "first things to buy," electric pumps for running water in kitchens and bathrooms.

The survey showed that 10,000 farmers will buy hay mowers and that another 10,000 want manure spreaders, indicating expansion of livestock growing and dairy farming.
