Seed Growers League To Meet January 15-16

The Oregon Seed Growers League will hold its annual meeting at the Multnomah hotel in Portland January 15 and 16. There will be five committees this year as follows: field seeds outlook and development; weed control; legislation and taxation; seed potato, and vegetable seeds.

Jackson county ranks 12th in Oregon in value of seed crops. Sugar beet seed has the highest average yield here of any county in the United States of lotus seed. It is one of the leading sections in ladino clover seed production and grows important quantities of hybrid corn and occasionally cover crops seeds such as vetch and ryegrass.

Committee assignments for the annual meeting from Jackson county include A. E. Brockway, C. H. Elmore and Claude Hoover on the fields seeds outlook and development committee, and Arnold Bohnert of Central Point on the vegetable seeds committee. Otto Bohnert of Central Point is vice-chairman of the vegetable seeds committee. All seed growers are invited to the meeting whether members of the seed league or not.
