size of a tennis ball and is said to be so powerful that it has a "pulverization range" of 53 miles. Scientists pointed out that there just isn't that much energy in an atom bomb that size. If Dr. Armattore's report were correct the bomb dropped on Hiroshima would be a firecracker by comparison. American experts believe that it would take Russia or any other country several years to turn out an atomic bomb even if they had all of our knowledge on the subject right now. And we hope that several years hence, international control will have precluded international competition in the production of atomic weapons.

SURVIVOR HUNT

When the war in the Pacific ended more than five months ago the Navy believed that some of its men who had survived plane crashes or ship sinkings were stranded on the atolls and coral reefs that dot the vast expanse of water where the fighting raged. But an exhaustive search has failed to produce a single

survivor awaiting rescue. On five islands there was evidence indicating that Allied personnel had been there but the men could not be located. Here and there among the thousands of atolls plane wreckage was found and the graves of flyers who were buried by the natives. The search also covered islands held by the Japanese. In spite of the thoroughness of the search, however, it is still possible that some "Robinson Crusoe" will be found during the next few years.
