

1946 Angling Rules Tentatively Set By Game Commission

The 1946 angling regulations were tentatively set by the Oregon State Game Commission at its meeting held in Portland on January 12. The final regulations will not be adopted until the adjourned meeting on January 26, in order to provide an opportunity to hear any objections that may arise.

The general season for trout six inches or over in length will be from April 20 to October 31 in all counties except Lake county where the season will open May 20, and Harney county where the opening date is set for May 4. The bag limit will be the same as last year, 15 fish or 15 pounds and 2 fish in any seven consecutive days.

The taking of trout ten inches or over in the coastal waters during the winter months will be prohibited except in the specified portion of the North and South Umpqua rivers. This action was taken to help conserve the supply of cutthroat trout.

Salmon and steelhead twenty inches and over may be taken the year

around as before with the exception of certain waters for which specific seasons are set. No changes were made in the regulations affecting jack salmon, striped bass, shad and sturgeon, which may be taken the year around on hook and line.

Black bass hereafter may be taken the year around in all counties except in Klamath county waters which will be closed during May and June to such fishing. The eight-inch minimum length limit on black bass also was removed. On account of the abundance of perch in most waters where this species is established, the bag limit on these fish was taken off. Otherwise, the bag limit for spiny-rayed fish remains the same as before, 30 fish or 20 pounds and 1 fish but not exceed 30 fish of all species combined. This limit will prevail in all counties, including Umatilla county which previously had a special regulation.

In order to stop the illegal snagging of salmon in the Rogue and Umpqua Rivers, an order was passed regulating the size of hooks and location of sinkers or weights on the line.

The regulations for the Rogue River and its tributaries remain the same as before with the exception that the season will open on April 27, and that the open season in the area between Illinois Falls and Fall Creek will be during the months of December, January and February.

Specific regulations for Jackson county follow:

Squaw Lakes, open season April 20 to October 31.

Fish Lake, open season April 20 to August 15. Bag limit, 10 pounds and 1 fish or not more than 10 fish.

S.P. to Add New Trains to Schedule

A pair of de luxe Diesel-powered daytime streamliners, to be called the Shasta Daylights, will be placed in daily service between Portland and San Francisco by the Southern Pacific Company, President A. T. Mercer announced today.

The new trains will operate over the fast Cascade line of the Shasta Route, it was stated, but bus service will be established from Grants Pass south to Dunsmuir, and from Roseburg north to Eugene to provide direct connections with Siskiyou line points.

Present overnight train service between Grants Pass and Portland, will remain in effect.

Along with his official announcement of the new coach streamliners, made at today's luncheon meeting of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Mercer also revealed plans for progressive streamlining of the Cascades, premier sleeper trains on the Portland-San Francisco run.

It is hoped the Shasta Daylights can be put in operation by the end of the year and that the new cars being planned for the Cascades will begin arriving early in 1947.

"We have given our ideas to the designers of the car building companies and they are now working out the technical details and specifications of the new coach streamliners," the railroad president said. "As soon as this information is available and bids can be made, the orders will be placed."

The Shasta Daylights will be postwar editions of Southern Pac-

ific's famous steam-powered Daylights on the coast and valley runs between San Francisco and Los Angeles, which have made railroad history as "everybody's streamliners" because of their low cost luxury trips. Each of the new trains will have 14 cars in addition to the Diesel-electric power units, and besides the coaches, will include baggage car, diner, kitchen car, coffee shop, tavern car and observation-parlor car. The diner-kitchen-coffee shop will form a three-car unit, with the kitchen in the center.

Exterior color schemes of the new streamliners will be the red, orange and black combinations of the San Francisco-Los Angeles Daylights, which the company believes will show to particular advantage against the contrasting greens of the Oregon landscape. The interior color schemes and exclusive fabrics, while not yet worked out in detail, will reflect the colors and characteristics of the Oregon scene. The dining car and coffee shop will also be representative of Oregon through the items to be carried on the menus.

While details of the train design, interior equipment and furnishings are not ready for announcement at this time, it was disclosed that new-type windows are being planned to give passengers a wide-angle view, vertically as well as horizontally. It was also pointed out that when the new trains start operating, Daylight streamliner service will be available for almost entire length of the Pacific Coast.

Improvements planned for the Cascades will include three-car diner-lounge units, similar to the luxurious and unique triple units now in the San Francisco-Los Angeles Larks. Streamlined sleeping cars will also be added when they can be delivered by manufacturers, it was stated.
