We were the smallest people on board and, for once, my size helped me out, so back we went. Later another fellow came back. We were able to take Violet on plane with us, and while she was scared to death she felt that if Joe and I were there it must be alright. I tried to keep her as close to me as possible. I felt sorry for the people up front but my going up wouldn't have helped them a bit, as they weighed too much to be allowed to come to the rear of the ship. They hung onto the ropes which lashed the baggage down and had a couple of inches of suitcase and trunks and case sticking out on which to brace their toes. The trip for me was quite comfortable but Joe was up front most of the way.

We expected to make a non-stop flight to Belem so Violet and I prepared a picnic lunch for the twenty people on board. Had a huge can of fried chicken and two cans of sandwiches, canned tomato and fruit juices, pickles and things and it sure tasted good up there in the cool air. We would open a can and pass it hand-to-hand up the catwalk to the Captain's compartment and then back again. We were so crowded it was funny and everybody had a good time I think.

**Dover Thinks Veterans Being Badly Treated**

Floyd K. Dover, a member of the state advisory committee of veterans affairs, announced to a group of veterans at Central Point, last Sunday that "The home folks have fallen down on the job where world war II veterans are concerned." Dover declared that throughout the war years a lot of big shot planning commissions promised great things for the veterans, and those plans have come to nothing.

"The result is that thousands of veterans in Oregon," he said, "have no jobs and no homes." He stated that he saw many veterans and their wives roaming the streets in Portland because they had no place to go, and that many were getting lodging in jails.

Dover said that those in charge of veterans affairs have not cooperated with the United States Employment Service, and that this service is in a position to, and is placing many men in positions every day.

The advisory committee member said that it is not only the duty of those in charge of veterans affairs to straighten out the situation but it must be done before the veterans who are out of jobs, and who have no homes begin getting together and organizing into groups to force demands that should be given willingly.

He also stated that he has asked the advisory committee to hold a meeting as soon as Hugh Rosson, state director of veterans affairs, returns from Washington, D. C.

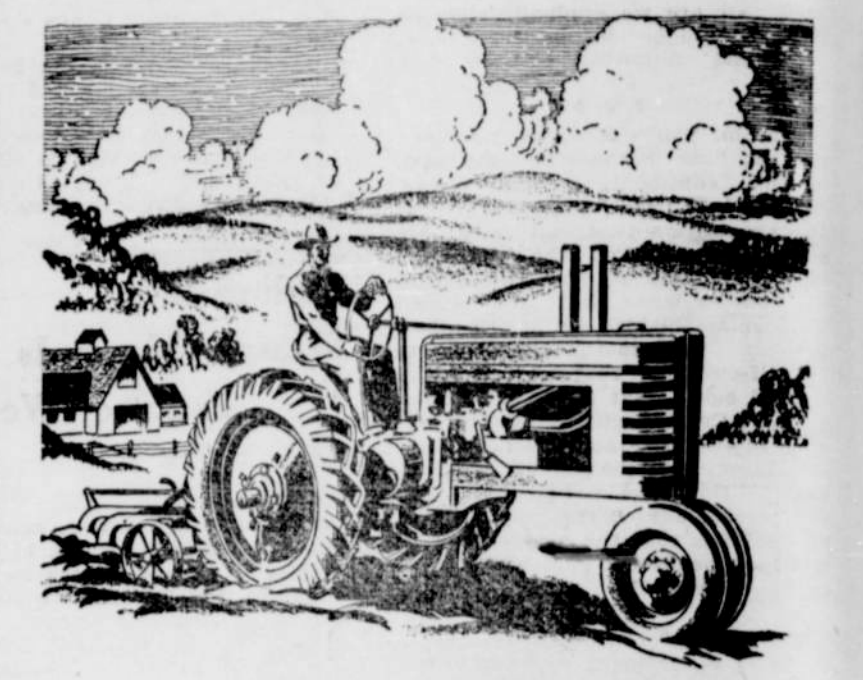
