**EDITORIALS**

**WOULD PRICES RISE?**

What can we look forward to if price controls on manufactured goods are removed? Would prices skyrocket?

Many people think so, though most manufacturers do not.

Manufacturers do not think that women would stand in line to buy nylons at \$6 or \$8 a pair if they knew that next month they would be \$2.

Manufacturers do not think people would pay \$10,000 for an automobile if they are convinced that in three or six months they can buy the same car for \$1,000.

Manufacturers do not think a store could sell a simple white shirt for \$10 if people know that in a matter of weeks they can buy all the shirts they want at \$1.95.

The plain fact is people do not bid up prices when an avalanche of goods is coming into the market.

People bid up prices only when they fear continuous and increasing shortages.

If price controls are removed and production starts rolling, the fear of shortages will evaporate like mist before the sun. People have confidence in the ability of industry to produce when given the chance.

**YOUR PROBLEM TOO**

The current wave of strikes in basic industries has taught the public one thing: that it has a very great interest in the problems of industry. The farmers of the Far West would soon be out of business if the products and services of plants located hundreds and thousands of miles away were shut off for any length of time. This interdependence of local enterprise, and for lack of a better name, national enterprise, has been too long unrecognized. Local Chamber of Commerce, local business men and local voters have been inexcusably disinterested in affairs beyond the limits of their communities. They have sanctioned destructive political crusades against individual industries. They have shrugged with indifference for years as Federal control reaches deeper and deeper into the coal industry, the power industry, the oil industry, the steel industry, and dozens of other industries. They are beginning to pay the penalty for this lack of interest. Present strikes are due in no small part to government policies, and they are but one of many disruptive influences of production, directly traceable to government.

A single industry, coal can make or break the living standards of everyone in the United States. From coal comes a list of divergent products used by every home and industry. Into the making of every ton

of steel goes a ton of bituminous coal. It generates more than 62% of all our electricity. And it powers 94% of all our railroad locomotives—our whole civilization depends on coal. And now it faces another strike tie-up.

Yes, the problems of a West Virginia coal mine operator are some of your business.
