

Medford Nine Defeats Central Point Team

Medford defeated Central Point 6 to 1 in the first baseball game of the season for Central Point Friday at the Medford High field.

Central Point was hampered by errors although Medford was allowed only 5 hits to Central Point's 6 hits. Colley struck out 6 and Hansen struck out one. Barnum, on the mound for Medford, was pulled after striking out three batters in the first inning and then allowing three hits and walking a runner in on balls in the second. Niedermeyer allowed 3 hits the rest of the game and struck out 2 batters.

The first inning started slow for Central Point with the first three fanning. Medford took the offensive and hammered out two hits to bring in Reich for one run before the side was retired.

Central Point started fast the second inning with a hit by Colley T. Fortune, and Smith. Barnum then gave Anders a walk on balls with the bases loaded. Colley T. was walked in for the lone tally of the game for Central Point. Colley T. struck

out two batters and assisted an out at first to retire Medford.

Niedermeyer took over pitching for Medford and Central Point failed to make any runs during the rest of the game.

Medford made one in the third inning, two in the fourth and two in the sixth for six runs.

Hansen took over for Colley T. in the sixth.
