

Local Ball Hurlers Lose to Medford

Medford Craters got off on the right foot in the Southern Oregon baseball league Sunday when they won over Central Point 24 to 0 at the Fairgrounds Park. The Craters were held scoreless in only the first inning as they tallied almost at will to run up one of the most lop-sided scores in the history of the league. Medford collected 19 base hits and were aided by 10 walks and eight Central Point errors.

Not until the seventh inning was a Central Point player able to reach third base. Wyatt, one of four Stud pitchers, reached the third sack on one of his four hits out of four times at bat but his teammates were unable to get him across. In the ninth frame Central Point filled the bases but Wyatt was nipped at home plate for the second out and Milhoan grounded out with the bags bulging to end the game.

Jim Snider, hurling his first game for the Craters turned in a magnificent performance, giving Central Point but four hits in the seven

frames he worked. Snider struck out three batters but had enough on the ball to make the batters hit it where he wanted them to. Ted Bergold took over in the eighth and gave up four hits and two walks, the only free passes given to Central Point all day.

Home Extension Plans for Year

The program for the years work of Home Extension Units within the county were mapped out Tuesday at a meeting in Medford. The outgoing chairman, and the new chairman and new secretaries from each unit meet in an all day session to plan this work. Mrs. Gertrude Ottlingers was chairman.

Miss Francis Clinton, Assistant State Home Demonstration leader, and Miss Marian Farrell, County Home Demonstration Agent were both present and spoke. Miss Clinton, also, installed the new officers. Both new officers and outgoing officers were presented corsages.

New County Committee members elected were Farantine Farlow, of Lake Creek, and Mrs. Ellyn Charlie, Lost Creek. Mrs. Olive Floyd was re-elected.

Four Standard Unit certificates were awarded, going to Eagle Point, Applegate, Howard and Central Point. Central Point won the gavel which has been in the possession of Eagle Point for the past two years. Central Point hopes to win it for three successive years, thereby earning the right to keep it.

Congress Appropriate Money for Farmers

Allocation to counties of \$2,813,000 made available by congressional appropriation for assisting Oregon farmers with soil and water conservation work this year has been announced by the state Production and Marketing Administration (formerly AAA) committee.

The funds will be used for practice payments to farmers under the 1946 agricultural conservation program, according to E. Harvey Miller, state committee chairman and PMA director. Each county's allocation is the maximum amount of payments that can be made in the county.

County agricultural conservation (AAA) committees control the expenditure of funds within counties so that the maximum in conservation is achieved for each dollar in practice payment, Miller said. Payment rates are set to provide that the government and the farmer share in the cost of carrying out approved practices to protect and improve basic agriculture resources.

Each farm's share of the county allocation is fixed by the county committee in accordance with the farm's conservation job and the amount of funds available. Payment is made only for practices approved by the county committee before the work is done.

Miller estimated that 25,000 Oregon farms are taking part in this

year's conservation practice program. May 1 was the last day to file a farm plan requesting participation in the program.

About \$300,000 more is available for conservation practices in the state this year compared with 1945, Miller said. All of the state allocation, except \$46,000 reserved largely for conservation services to farmers in connection with practices requiring engineering and other technical aids, has been distributed to counties.

The allocations for Jackson county is \$75,000.

INTERNATIONAL Harvester is getting back into production with all possible speed. Extra shifts are being employed wherever conditions permit, to try to overcome the production losses of the recent strike. Everything is being done to get parts and machines to you.

While we and our dealers would like to tell you that this means an immediate end to the shortage of service parts and machines, it is more accurate to say that it means the beginning of the end of it. If illness or bad weather delays you seriously in the Spring, you know how much it throws you off your schedule. The strike has thrown our schedules off balance, too. There are many "chores" we must do before new machines reach you.

Material shortages



The preliminary chores of getting our plants back into shape for full production are finished. But disturbances in other industries and resulting material shortages may affect our plans. Light gauge steel sheets, brass and copper, fractional horse power motors, and many other items are all very short. The coal situation may also prove serious—we hope not.

Refilling the well



Both our dealers and our branches have ran dry on parts and new machines. So the biggest chore is to get their working stocks back to normal. It will take time to fill the pipeline to dealers—just as it takes time for you to refill a well or cistern after it has run dry.

Stock and display rooms of our dealers represent not one, but ten thousand reservoirs which must be refilled. The most heroic pro-

duction efforts will mean that your local dealer can expect only a small number of parts and machines at a time. Since we must play fair with all our customers, there will be a sprinkle of parts and machines all over the country—not a downpour in any one section.

You will be glad to know that all repair parts production schedules are far beyond normal.

No hoarding



You may be sure that every machine will be shipped to dealers as soon as completed. We do not and will not hold machines off the market.

At the start of the strike we had on hand at all our factories and branches just 837 tractors of all kinds—less than two days' production—and 405 of these were not completed. Many of those on hand had one or more important parts missing—principally radiator cores. Most of the rest represented the normal daily "float" between the end of the assembly line and the shipping platform. Naturally no tractors were made during the strike.

What dealers may have for you



We can report to you that our current production on TRAC-

TORS is good and we are shipping at a normal rate. Even so, there will not be enough to go around. The situation on PLOWS

and DISK HARROWS is reasonably good. On COMBINES, MOWERS, HAY BAKES, ONE-MAN HAY BALERS, CORN PICKERS and many other items, our schedules have been seriously disrupted. We must in fairness say that many of our customers are likely to be disappointed on delivery of these machines. On MILKING MACHINES, STATIONARY ENGINES, and some other small units we are hopeful of making practically normal delivery.

We know you will understand the reasons why your dealer cannot fill your orders tonight. He would like to give you the kind of delivery on machines you would like to get, but his situation is a difficult one and not of his own making. He is doing the best he can.
