GO-OP TO BUILD STORAGE PLANT

The plan that the Grange Supply Co-op made last February are being completed, they have leased Southern Pacific railway property on the southwest corner of highway 99 and Pine street for construction of the large feed manufacturing mill and storage facilities authorized by members of the association at its annual meeting February 9. It was announced recently by Earl Weaver, manager of the cooperative.

Plans for the structure, cost of which was set at between \$75,000 and \$85,000 by preliminary estimates in February, are not quite complete according to Weaver. The directors who discussed the matter at a meeting last Monday, will convene again Wednesday and more details may be available after that time.

Cooperative members at the annual conclave generally favored erection of the building this summer in readiness for storage of the coming fall crops. Users of the storage space could leave their produce there from harvest time until it could be sold.

The property acquired is 190 by 115 feet. Members of the association authorized the directors to proceed with the construction with a vote of 95 for and 15 opposed to building the mill.
