Forged Sugar Stamps Appearing Here

Forged sugar ration stamps are being presented to local grocers, it was reported at the meeting of the Medford volunteer price panel last Tuesday night, and merchants were warned to be watchful and check stamps presented for sugar. One grocer reported that several of the forged stamps had been presented in his establishment, with the clerks detecting three before the sales were completed.

At the office of the war price and rationing board it was stated that tampering with the stamps is a federal offense for which stiff fines can be imposed upon conviction. Three different women customers who attempted to pass the forged stamps fled hastily when checkers discovered the trick, it was reported to the price panel.

Facts Told About Famine in Europe

The people here in America have just a vague idea of the conditions in Europe. We do not know what it is like to be starving like the people in Europe are today. In some countries, there is a person dying from starvation every two minutes. In Poland there are 10,000 people dying monthly of tuberculosis. In all Europe, 80,000,000 face starvation this last winter and many millions are still starving. In Rotterdam there are many boys and girls three or four years old that weigh only about 14 lbs. Last year many of them ate nothing but tulip bulbs. In many places the birds are doing well to find food for themselves. The children of Europe have about forgotten how to eat a slice of bread.

These facts that I have written made me realize that this second World War was the worst war that we have ever known, and that the after effects are even worse.

Our eighth grade teacher, Mrs. Cramer, lay sick in bed one day. While she was lying there, she was thinking of a way in which we could do some little thing for those starving people. She wondered if we could make a box to put on her desk, so we could share our money that we would ordinarily be spending for candy, gum, or other sweets, with the starving.

Later Mrs. Cramer took a pencil and paper and figured that if we would each turn in ten cents each week and many other schools would do the same, that we would turn in millions of dollars each year to help the starving world. She brought her idea before the class and everyone thought that it was a very good suggestion.

The first thing that we did was to get a box with several slots in the top for our room. Then as an English project we wrote letters to other schools in our state, mostly in this county. It wasn't very long until we received a few letters telling about what a good idea it was, and that they were taking it up. Many schools in this state have taken it up and telling other schools about it. Golh Hill seems to be turning in more than any other school of the county, and its originators are not doing as well as they should be doing. Our class has turned in between \$70.00 and \$75.00 since February of this year.

I think that this is a good idea and I hope that it will keep spreading. I hope that during our vacation we will not forget that we have a world to feed, but that we will try to keep sharing our plenty.

I realize that the other nations are in terrible need, and how terrible it would be if we were starving like, or with them. I believe that other people are seeing the same thing. Now that a crime wave is spreading throughout our country it will be even harder to quiet the unrest in the starving countries. There is one way out and that is to stop all evil in the world and to begin by sharing our plenty while there is still a chance.

SPAWNING OPERATIONS AT DIAMOND LAKE

Spawning operations at Diamond Lake yielded 5,500,000 rainbow trout eggs for this season according to the report received from the game Commission's egg-taking crew, which has

been in at the lake since early April. A large percentage of the fish hatched will be turned back into the lake.

Anglers planning to open the season on June 8 at Diamond Lake will find the road open to travel. Only trout ten inches or more in length may be taken, and the bag limit is 15 pounds and 1 fish but not to exceed 5 fish in any one day, or 30 pounds and 2 fish but not to exceed 20 fish in any 7 consecutive days.
