

Exams to Be Held For Academy Appointment

Congressman Harris Ellsworth announced today that preliminary qualifying examinations for vacancies at both the United States Naval Academy, and the United States Military Academy, will be conducted by the United States Civil Service Commission July 24th at the Post-office Buildings in Albany, Coos Bay, Eugene, Grants Pass, Medford and Roseburg.

Candidates for admission must be bona fide residents of the Fourth District and must never have been married. Successful candidates will enter the Academy July 1, 1947. The Naval Academy appointees must have reached their 17th birthday, and the Military Academy candidates their 18th birthday by that date. The maximum ages are 21 and 22 respectively as of the date of entrance. The examination will be approximately one hour in length and will be confined to word meanings, simple principals of physics and mechanics, and to arithmetic. Appointment of principals and alternates will be made on the basis of grades earned in the examination.

Candidates desiring to compete should notify Congressman Harris Ellsworth, House Office Building, Washington, D.C. not later than July 10th. They should indicate their choice of the place for examination and give their date of birth.

John Cox Appointed On K.O.G. Committee

Governor Earl Snell this week notified Mr. Harry Chipman, Jackson County Chairman that Mr. John B. Cox of Medford had been selected at the recent meeting of the Willamette Valley Logging Conference to give all possible aid to Keep Oregon Green.

The naming of Mr. Cox as a representative of the logging industry means closer cooperation from the loggers of this section, the county chairman pointed out, as he is a logger and was named by Allen C. Smith, retiring president of the Conference to represent the loggers of Jackson County in fire prevention work.

At the annual session of this group at Eugene in May the loggers urged their membership to give whole-hearted support to Keep Oregon Green, and asked Governor Snell to name a logger in each of the eighteen Western Oregon counties to work with the local KOG committees and whose job would be to get the logging industry organized to reduce the number of man-caused forest fires. His logging Conference made the nominations to the Governor.

"We expect a greatly increased hazard from out-of-state travelers in our woods," Don Paul M. Dunn, state head of KOG pointed out in a letter to the local chairman, "all of which means we must double our efforts to prevent forest and range fires caused by careless acts of our citizens. This season will see our woods extremely dry." Listing principal causes of forest fires as camp fires, cigarettes, and throwing of lighted material into dry material, Dunn urged every citizen to use a "degree of caution and common sense" when using the forests and fields of our state to help Keep Oregon Green.

Farm Security Office In New Location

The Farm Security Administration office has moved from 211 Fluhrer Building to Room 307 in the Post Office Building, Mr. Stein, FSA Supervisor stated today. The office will be located in the Post Office Building temporarily.

Mr. Stein stated that loan funds for all types of farm loans after July 1, when new budget allotments will be made. He further states that he will continue to be in his office from 8 to 5 each Friday for interviews.

Oregon Vets May Receive State Aid

Oregon veterans with disabilities incurred outside of service and thereby not coming within the scope of Veterans Administration aid are reminded that they are entitled to assistance from the state division of vocational rehabilitation, it was pointed out this week by Department of Veterans Affairs officials.

This division of the state Department of Education provides medical diagnosis, physical restoration if needed, vocational guidance, and vocational training to fit the needs of disabled persons, Supervisor Charles F. Felke explained.

He said that while set up to help all citizens of Oregon, the service is available as well to veterans whose disabilities are such that they are not entitled to aid under Public Law 16 for disabled veterans.

Division Agent Milton E. Coe said a veteran in Dayton, for example,

had been in the army two months and was discharged due to aggravation of a previous injury. He received training from the state and is now working as a radio repairman.

Another veteran in McMinnville was discharged after 59 days of service because of a back injury suffered in his high school football days. He has now applied for pre-rehabilitation office, not being eligible for this training from the Veterans Administration.

By virtue of the state's program for the handicapped, it is possible for a veteran to get additional aid in completing his college education after using up his GI rights under Public Law 346. A case was cited at Oregon State college where a veteran, eligible for three years of GI schooling, will have his last year of

training paid by the state, because of a physical handicap which was not service-incurred.

Depending on the man's need, the state defers such costs as tuition, tools and training supplies, it was explained. Veterans seeking this help were advised to write the division of vocational rehabilitation, State Library building, Salem. Agent of the division will call later in their home communities.

Seems to me most strikes net little for the men—but a lot of personal glory for the union leaders.

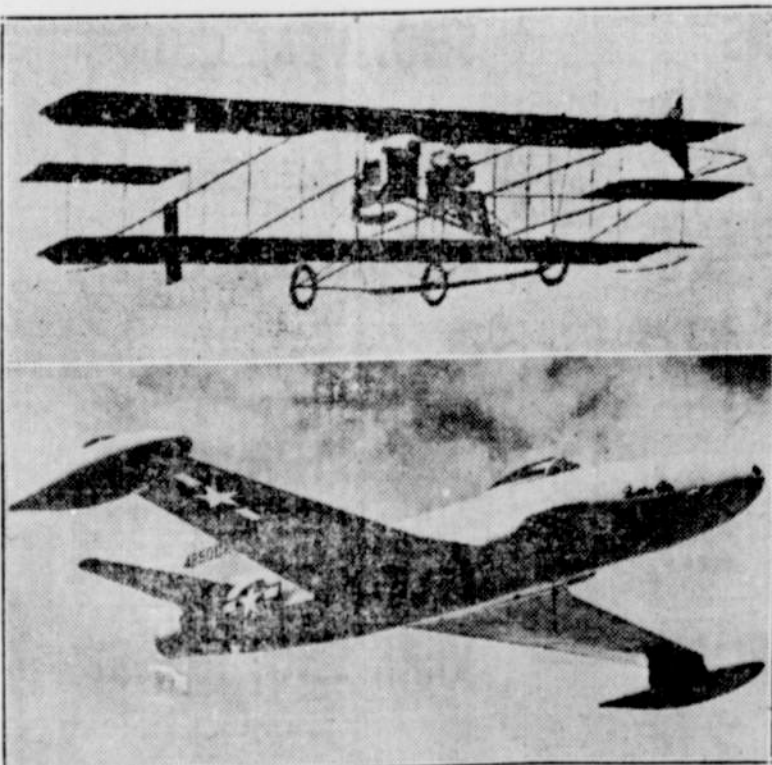
General Motors strikers could have had most of their gains without a strike.

HUDSON VALLEY SEES ANOTHER HISTORIC FLIGHT—The Army Air Forces P-50 Shooting Star, powered by an I-40 G-E jet motor, will retrace the aerial route blazed along the Hudson River Valley by Glenn H. Curtiss 36 years ago. The flight was scheduled for the afternoon of June 21 at the opening of the General Electric Company's air research demonstration. Curtiss in his little biplane (above) made the trip from Albany to New York City in two hours and 51 minutes. His average speed was slightly over 50 miles an hour.

The Shooting Star (below), piloted by an AAF officer, covers the same distance in approximately 15 minutes. The route of the new jet plane is from above the City Hall in New York up the valley to the State House at Albany and thence in a two-minute dash to the Schenectady County Air Port. Flight operations of advanced types of AAF, Navy and civilian planes begin this national demonstration.

There was much fanfare in Curtiss' pioneering achievement in 1910. He won the \$10,000 prize offered by Joseph Pulitzer for the flight from Albany to New York under 24 hours and comparison was made between his flying time and the historic voyages of Henrik Hudson and Robert Fulton over the same route. Hudson's time in his sailing vessel the "Half Moon" in 1609 was five days, while Fulton's run in the steam-
