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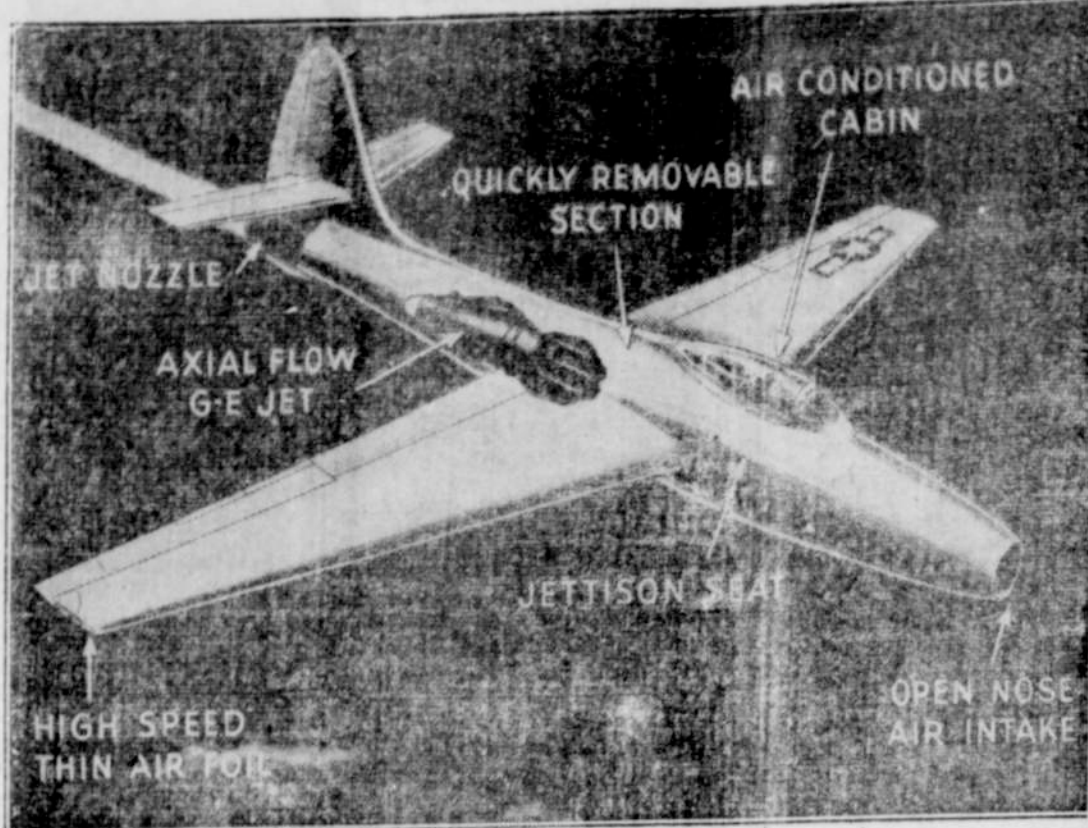
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IT FLIES NEARLY 10 MILES A MINUTE—The Army Air Forces has just announced the new XP-84 fighter, powered by the new type axial flow G-E Jet, which will fly at a speed of 590 miles an hour and perform smoothly at well over seven miles above the earth. This schematic drawing of the Republic Thunderbolt shows in operation the axial flow jet engine, one of which was exhibited to the public for the first time at the General Electric Air Research Demonstration at the Schenectady Airport on June 21 and 22.
