1946 Hunting Seasons And Bag Limits Set

The 1946 hunting seasons and bag limits were set tentatively by the Oregon State Game Commission at its annual hearing held Saturday, July 13, in Portland. The hearing was adjourned to July 27 when the final regulations will be adopted.

The general season for blacktail and mule deer was set for September 28 to October 26 with a bag limit of one deer having not less

than forked antlers.

For Rocky Mountain Elk the general season will be from October 25 to November 17 in the area east of the Dallas-California highway. Bag limit will be one elk of either sex except that in Wallowa, Union and that part of Umatilla county east of Highway 395 the bag limit is one bull elk with antlers. Also the bag limit is one bull elk with antlers in the Muddy Creek area, Baker county, during open season from August 31 to September 2, inclusive.

The general season for Roosevelt elk will be open from October 26 to November 16, and the bag limit is one bull elk with forked horns or better. Open area includes Lane, Lincoln, Deschutes, Klamath and specified portions of Clatsop, Tillamook, Coos and Douglas counties.

In addition several special deer and elk seasons were declared to take care of problem areas, for most of which only a limited number of permits will be issued. While hunters may file for more than one special deer tag, in the event he is successful in more than one drawing, only one tag will be issued. Hunters, however, are asked not to file applications for special tags until after the adoption of the final regulations on July 27.

Archers will have two special deer seasons. One is from September 28 to October 6, inclusive, in a small area in the vicinity of Paulina creek on the Deschutes game refuge. Bag limit is one deer of either sex. The other season is for deer of either sex from October 9 to 16 in a portion of the Canyon Creek refuge.

No antelope hunting will be allowed this year. Also there will be no open season on Hungarian partridge. Tagging regulations will be enforced this year, and all game held during the closed season or shipped into closed areas or out of the state will have to be tagged by the game law enforcement authorities.

Housing Shortage May Limit OSC Students

Oregon State College—"It is with much regret that we are obliged to return herewith your deposit for a dormitory reservation at O.S.C. this fall."

This is the opening sentence in a letter sent to hundreds of prospective students here because all space is filled with many waiting for all college controlled housing facilities. Applicants from Oregon are now being told that they are welcome to enter Oregon State this fall but that they will have to arrange for their own living space. Admission of new out-of-state students was cut drastically early this year, and now no application from other states is accepted except for most unusual

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reasons.

College officials are preparing for a fall enrollment of approximately 6000, which is about 1300 more than in any previous term. Of these only about 4000 can be housed in dormitories, cooperatives, fraternities and sororities, and even this total is dependent upon completion on schedule of federal surplus housing. Some students are planning to commute from as far as Albany and Lebanon.

Prospective students are being asked by college officials here to consider the possibility of taking their freshman year at less crowded units of the state system and then transfer credits here.
