OUR POOR RAILROADS

The railroads came out of the war in high speed with huge profits, but according to United States News their passenger revenue at the present time is "up 7%" and their freight revenue "up 3%." But since 1939 costs of the railroads are "up 50%."

That isn't a very good showing, especially in view of the fact that the Interstate Commerce Commission is bowing the railroads around and doesn't want to pull the lines out of the hole and give them increased prices they are begging for.

Are our railroads headed towards hard times? They aren't having a bit of luck in trying to throw the airplane industry into the ditch. In fact between planes and motor carriers the railroads are up against heavy competition for the first time in history.

LET'S ALL PULL FOR MORE EDUCATION

The Nation clamors for better education for the youth, for the returning soldier, for the girls and women who have done so much for their country and for civilization.

Maybe education would point the way to put a check on crime waves, lawlessness, accidental killings, murders and tragedies of all kinds.
